I am doing a reset – here's to a happy, healthy and sane New Year to all. May the biggest concern we have is whether to drive our Corvair's or not. The decision should always be drive them of course.

RnR Garage

I have to say that work has been slow in the garage. It is not heated and it gets real cold in there. I have started the Rampy a few times and driven it up and down the driveway although that is challenging. It is hard to describe the issue except to say that it bogs down when put under a load. Backing up the driveway produces the load if you remember the slope of the driveway. I have not done any troubleshooting outside of thinking it is not advancing the timing and/or something in the transmission is not working properly (automatic).

I still need to figure out a way to reconnect the gas pedal to the floor since I broke one mounting screw off in the hidden nut. My choices are to weld a stud over the broken bolt although I do not have a welder or to use the same hidden nut set up.

As soon as some nice weather comes back I also want to tackle the windshield. I may try this myself but I think I have a lead on a guy that does classic windshield replacements at a great price.

While putting the trickle charger on the Corsa I discovered the vacuum advance had come off the carb fitting. I have no

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idea how long it was not connected but it now makes sense on why the car ran differently than I expected. Once connected, it ran fine so now I will make sure to check it often.

Andy's Garage

Our last tech session was held at Andy's house. To remind everyone what happened, below is a recap of that session.

You may be asking why this matters. It's because our next meeting (in a few days) will be held at Andy's garage again. The main focus will be electrical work so bring your meters and electrical diagrams for an Early.

In November, the issues at hand were starting/carburetor problems, electrical anomalies and overheating. That's a tall order to tackle in one session so we concentrated on the carburation issues.

Bryan was able to provide an in depth list of trouble shooting procedures in an attempt to clean the carbs and get it to start and run smoothly. Everyone else also poked their respective heads under the hood to observe and suggest repairs.

We had several earlies in the driveway that we could use as "this is what it's supposed to look like" comparison which was a nice luxury. We checked the timing and adjusted the point dwell then readjusted the timing. Between each step there was a lot of discussion as to the benefits of the test/adjustment so it certainly wasn't a 30 minute exercise.

After all the adjustments were made and the driver (Andy) was provided with detailed instructions on the proper starting procedures, things seemed to be working much better. Folks started drifting out with Doug being the last to leave. Andy tried starting the car and the same issues seemed to resurface. Doug heard the engine cranking and turned off his engine to return to readjust everything again. It was midafternoon before he finally left with instructions to keep him posted on the status.

His final guidance was to clean the carbs, use some SeaFoam additive to the gas and run the car for a bit before tackling a complete carb rebuild effort. Also check the plugs to ensure the correct ones were installed. "Keep me posted" were his final parting words. Next month we will get a report on the success or failure of the repairs.

That is an overview of the last session to fix a few items with the electrical one still needing addressing.
