Enough of being philosophical. Let's get into Corvair mode. Rita and I have been as busy as possible working on Rampy. The wiring is all done except for a 60 amp circuit breaker that I will attach to the positive side of the battery. On the other side of the breaker I will attach the alternator wire and the 10 gauge red (mine is black) wire that runs up to the instrument cluster.

This Labor Day weekend we are going to install the gas tank. Once in, we will add some gas and see if we can get Rampy started again. Prior to that, I have to fill the crankcase with good, but inexpensive, oil

to clean the crankcase of the gas/oil mixture. I drained the oil last week and it smells like gas. You have to love the Clark's manual fuel pumps. The one I had on the engine was new although it is a few years old. I bought an airtex electric fuel pump which I will install after I get it up and running again. I need to ensure the wiring is correct before I dive into the fuel pump.

In between getting some quality time on Rampy I decided to install a racing stripe on Corvy. I am a complete rookie with doing this kind of work but it actually came out pretty nice. Just don't get too close. I still have the hood to do, which will prove to be just as challenging I am sure.

Attached are two pictures of my handy work. The first one is after I got the trunk (only) done. This was taken at the birthday car parade that we attended via Darren P. The second picture is after I finished the cowling and windshield panel, which were a lot easier to install than I thought.

The Tool Addict "Luck of the Drawer"

I recently acquired a used rollaway - that's a story for another day - and in the process I removed all the drawers. There on the bottom were a couple old brake tools that must have fallen behind a drawer and vanished into the case bottom. Of course they got a cursory cleaning and in the brake tool drawer they went. One was a Snap On drum adjusting spoon, with this kind of strange curved shape, not like my other straight blade versions. I didn't give it any other thought until recently, when Stefan came home with a caliper dragging on the rear of his Crown Vic.

Now, this car has four wheel discs, but the emergency brake is a drum unit that's hidden inside the rotor, which doubles as a very small drum (they are 7 1/4" shoes). Not only was the caliper seized, but when I got the rotor off (after some effort), the lining had come off one shoe and was wedged between the other shoe and drum. So, order a set of calipers, pads hoses, rotors, and emergency brake shoes and hardware. Almost two jobs in one!

Of course this little drum brake is different from a Corvair, but it still has an adjuster you access through the backing plate. What's odd is that it's a bit offset from the hole. "Ah ha!" I thought, "I'll bet that's what that strange adjusting spoon is for." Well, it definitely was better than a straight version, but I could tell it wasn't quite mode for this job. So after getting cleaned up, it was off to the Internet to satisfy my curiosity.

A quick search showed that Snap On still sells it, under the vague heading of "Brake

Adapter" and with a description of the tool but no mention of what kind of car or truck exactly it's for. The one I have has the old script logo and a date stamp of 2001, so I knew the design had been around for a while. A couple of eBay listings mentioned 'vintage' so my next stop was the Collecting Snap On site, which has a large archive of scanned catalogs. A search there got a hit on page 87 of the 1967 catalog, item L:

"B-1461 Brake Adjusting Tool for use on 1960 - 67 Corvair, Buick Special, Olds F-85, Rambler, and Tempest. One tang set at 29° with a wheel finder radius for rear brakes, the other tang set at 45° with special curve to clear ball joint on front brakes. 8 1/4" long."

So, there's the mystery solved! I guess that "special curve" has proven useful on enough other cars to warrant them keeping it in stock for all these years, I certainly found it handy on the Vic. But I'm looking forward to trying it out for the designed purpose!
