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

A great "Cabin Fever" buster for many area car guys is the annual swap meet sponsored by the Wichita A's. Since I had sold my Wesfalia trailer, I needed a way to haul my "junk" to the swap meet. The MCCA trailer was languishing behind the shop so I pulled it in and got it road worthy (See story on page 5).

MCCA member Bob Horstman stopped by my booth and said he remembered cutting up and welding the body of the trailer, over 20 years ago, when MCCA started on the project. The trailer drew many comments and Corvair stories during the two day swap meet.

Other MCCA members had booths set up. Bob & Lee Bright were set-up a few aisles over and down from my booth. Bob was

selling his aftermarket hot rod supplies. In another building Tom & Kathy Stout had a booth with a Corvair Turbocharger and a lot of other non-corvair used parts for sale. Other MCCA members were spotted seeking treasure or just stopping by the booth to rest and chat. Keith Leslie was down from Topeka and said he is planning to make Cold Tuna. Lloyd Folger warmed a chair for awhile and showed the die-cast Corvair model he purchased. Ned and Kathy Madsen took some time out of their quest for a 1965 Kingman County tag to visit. Greg Renfro was seen purchasing and carrying some F\*(D parts . . . shame, shame.



### MCCA club trailer Rehab in progress

This project started over 20 years ago when Bob Horstman assisted by several MCCA members cut up a '64 Corvair, and mated the front and rear body sections into an enclosed trailer body. About eight years ago at the first Juna Tuna, Harold "Spyderman" Morgan brought it up to the Kalp shop for more work. It was flipped over and a trailer tongue was mounted and the steering centerlink was welded to the crossmember of the stock Corvair front axle.

The first road test resulted in a wag faster than a puppy tail at 15 m.p.h. Several bags of Quickcrete and a filled cement block were added to put more weight in front of the axle. This made no difference in the happy puppy syndrome. So the trailer was pulled to the back of the Kalp Shop and parked.

In January, Terry pulled the trailer around to the workshop area and began to try and solve some of the towing problems. One theory was that the centerlink welded to the crossmember was causing a lot of bump steer, so Terry measured the location on a stock corvair and found it was 3" out from the crossmember, so a rectangular tubing standoff was made and welded to the crossmember and center link to hold it in the correct position.

Another theory was that the front axle being 6" ahead of the center line of the axle was also causing part of the wag. The trailer was flipped over. The hat shaped "frame" section that mounted the front axle flared out and ended shortly behind the axle mounting. Terry cut the flared portion off then found some rectangular tubing that would fit the hat section and used it to extend two rails to the back of the trailer. Once the rails were fitted and welded the two halves of the trailer were solidly tied together and once holes were drilled the front axle could be bolted back in eight inches behind the previous location.

Moving the axle back meant that the back half of the wheel wells and some of the other rear structure had to be cut out to provide clearance for the tires. Also the wheel openings on the side no longer lined up with the wheels so they would have to go also. Terry got to play with the SawsAll and Plasma cutter a lot.

Once everything was back together the trial run

showed no return of the previous problems. There is a lot of work left to be done. Member input is requested for the design of the inside of the trailer, should it be an open space or should there be compartments? Show up at Cold Tuna with your ideas.



## **Pre-'16 car collection tour**



Dan Boulton of Oklahoma City has been collecting Brass-era cars for most of his long life. This row of magnificent cars was just half his collection. Dan was a great host answering many questions and explaining many of the details of these almost 100 year old cars. Terry Kalp didn't know how lucky he was when he headed out to attend the January meeting of the Oklahoma City Corvair club on Thursday, January 14th. With friend, Dan Hagenbuch, Terry took out in the fog at 7 am. Their plan was to take Route 66 from Yukon to Clinton, OK to tour the Rt 66 museum before making the evening Corvair meeting.

The first part of the meeting was dinner at the County Line BBQ. Excellent food and conversation. The second part of the meeting was to tour the pre-1916 car collection of Dan Boulton. It was an exception display of cars. Dan and his 1910 Packard Model 30 were featured in the February 2010 Hemmings Classic Car magazine tribute to Packards. The other part of the building was Dan's extremely well equipped restoration shop.

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#### HACOA Tech Very informative

Mike Dawson of the Kansas City Corvair club (HACOA) holds a monthly tech session at his garage. MCCA member, Terry Kalp drove up for the January session that runs from 3 pm to 6 pm then some supper afterward.

First up was Scott Allison demonstrating how to use Plastigauge to determine rod bearing clearances. After Scott's great presentation was Mike Dawson explaining the different Corvair flywheels, clutch discs, pressure plates and input shafts. Another outstanding demonstration.

After the educational was the nutritional, a very tasty soup supper with many side dishes. As the dishes were cleared, Travis brought

in a differential and Mike replaced the broken snout and set the gear pattern and backlash.
