
Nov. Dinner Meeting At Bright's Home

2013 Roundup Job List

Well, it our turn to host the Great Plains Corvair Roundup next year. This will be the 9th time for this fun event. I "volunteered" to be the chairman of the event, but I need lots of help.

I would like to start with a tour of the prospective host hotel in Newton. We're considering a Best Western again. It's right off I-135 in Newton. I'm asking for some volunteers to meet up in Newton to look around the town with an eye for things our guests can do on Saturday afternoon. I'm also going to try to set up some help from the Chamber of Commerce. I'm also going to set up a visit to the hotel to see the facilities and some rooms. Please contact me by any means if you're interested. I'm thinking this could be a nice afternoon adventure.

As I mentioned, I'm going to need lots of help to pull off another great Roundup. The following is a list of the jobs I dreamed up for the business meeting on 11/4. I wrangled a few folks into accepting a few positions but there's still plenty of opportunities. Even if there's a name by the job you really like, you can certainly help out.

Registration Coordinator- Handle the collection of registrations both before and during the event. In charge of name tags and having people at the registration table. – Doug is going to take this on. He'll need lots of folks to help staff the registration table.

Hospitality Room Coordinator – Gathering the "stuff" for the hospitality room and making sure the room is hospitable. I think Lee and Jean are going to take this on. We'll be counting on all of our members to bring some goodies to make our guests feel welcome.

Tee-Shirt Coordinator – Come up with the design of the tee-shirt and handle getting them made and distributed. Part of this job is designing and selecting the graphic that will represent the Roundup. We discussed a couple ideas and we're counting on members creativity. We have also decided to follow the lead of OKC this year. The only way to get a tee shirt is to pre-register. This little enticement resulted in about 90% of the folks to preregister.

Valve Cover Race/Model Car Contest Coordinator – In charge of setting up race registration and running the race. This person is also going to be in charge of setting up the model car contest. Terry volunteered for this job.

Car Show Coordinator – In charge of herding the cats Saturday morning for the car show, counting ballots and determining the class winners. Larry Lee was roped into taking on this take. This is a big part of the Roundup and I'm sure he'll need and appreciate all the help he can get, especially when counting the votes.

Saturday Afternoon Event Coordinators – After the car show, we need something to fill the time before the banquet. All ideas are welcome.

Award Coordinator – Use the tee-shirt graphic and make up the awards for the car show, VC race, model cars and special awards like hard luck and long distance.

Banquet Coordinator – This is another very important job. Come up with location (if not at hotel) and food for the banquet

For the past Roundups we've hosted, I've had lots of fun helping to put them together. I've also developed special relationships, in a good way, with my fellow club members. I sure hope they have felt the same way. The work isn't really that hard, usually. Please consider taking on one (or more) of these positions or helping out in any way. the time we had a rescue kit put together and someone set to deliver it, Chris called back and said he got it started . . . thought it was a loose battery connection.

Chris Teer and passenger Chris Crider made it to the shop by 11 am and his '64 went up on the lift to get a gas filler neck hose replacement. He also had fresh front anti-roll bar bushings to install.

Soon it was time for lunch, it was a feast. Several soups were offered, chicken and noodles, potato soup, turkey chili and Greg Renfro's pepper powered, paint removing, hot chili. Salads from tossed to 'tater filled a card table and another bench sported pies, cookies and cakes.

After lunch, several of the spouses headed out on a quilt and antique shopping trip and work resumed on the Corvairs. The Chrises set out to repair the vent hose fitting that came loose from the gas tank in the removal process. KC Gary Moore and I did an FC engine swap, his 102 for my '64 95 hp with a rod knock. The transmission was going back together,



KC Differential Clinic ends well

On Sunday, October 28th Ned Madsen's HHR was packed with Ned, Kathy and Terry Kalp plus a couple of Corvair differentials and the bearings, seals and tools to refurbish them. Mike Dawson of the KC Corvair club was putting on a clinic on differentials.

Mike showed the dozen participants how to dismantle, reassemble, set pre-load on the bearings and shim the pinion for the proper tooth engagement. Most everyone had brought a differential to work on and by the end of the session the differentials were ready to go back in operation. It was Ned's first visit to the Dawson Corvair Compound and he was amazed.

Ned helped with a LM tune-up and several other projects. About 2:30-3:00 some people started filtering away, but the fuel tank and transmissions projects were going strong. By about 5:30-6 everything was buttoned up.

When Chris Teer went to start his Corvair to pull it off the lift, he needed a jumpbox to get it going. Checked the battery voltage and found his alternator wasn't charging . . . a little investigation showed a very loose battery output post on the alternator. Pulled the internally regulated alternator off and apart to find a lot of damage from the loose post arcing and the internal nut on the post mostly eaten away. Redied the threads on the post and found a new nut. put everything back together and on the Corvair . . . still no charge, so some of the electronics must have been damaged also. Dug out a flaps rebuilt internally regulated alternator and converted it over to Corvair front, fan and pulley. When this unit was installed there was rejoicing when the voltmeter rose to 14 volts with the engine running and lights on. So at about 8:30 the two Chrises were on the road for their three hour drive back to OKC, all the Kalp Corvairs were back in their spots and another Tuna went down on the record books.

Factory Freddie . . .

This year hasn't had too many "Fast Eddie" type events. Part of that is because I've chosen not to run the SCCA events because of their cost and time inefficiency. The PCA events seem to almost always happen when there's another Corvair event. Another excuse is that my car is just too uncomfortable. The restrictive seats, stiff suspension and loud engine all add up to something I didn't want to drive too much. There might also be some lack of interest because I felt the car was done. Another contribution to declining interest was no local competition. Jim and I may have argued about things like early versus late or the best line around a course, I still really enjoyed the competition. As my use of "the silver car" decreased, my desire to sell it increased. I wasn't very active, not really trying too hard. I did still have fun with it. Well that changed at this year's Roundup.

Scott Allison suggested we trade, my silver car for his tan car. I think he was kidding. That is right up till I said, "Maybe." I thought about it for most of the day Saturday. Kathy liked the idea too. The interesting thing about "the tan car" is that it's the opposite of the silver car. Where the silver car is modified almost as much as it can and still be street legal, the tan car is very original. Scott impressed me with the responsibility of ownership of such an original car. Still, with a 95 hp engine and PG, it's not going to satisfy my "need for speed." Terry has made a wonderful offer for that. He says I can use the Shark whenever I want. That's going to be fun. That could give me the subject matter

As for the future of the tan car, I'm going to try to keep it original. No cutting things up for stuff like a radio and speakers. It already has

AC, so it will be the hot weather cruiser for now. I do feel a bit uncomfortable driving it too much because of its value. Not monetary value, but it's like driving a museum piece. Time will tell what happens, I'm just going to enjoy the drive.
