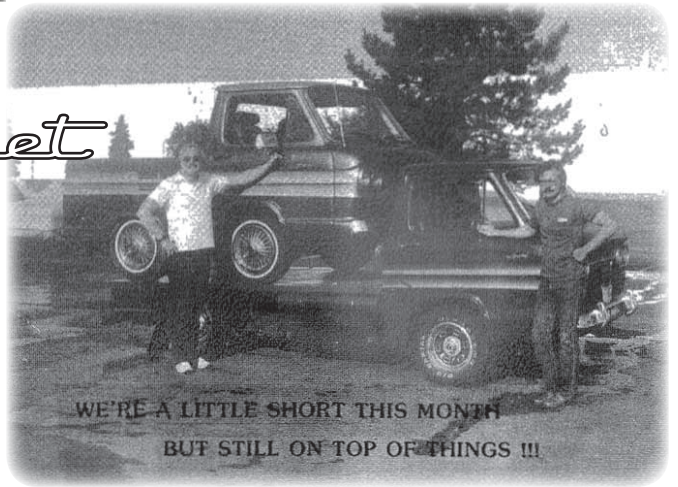

Another Take on Wood Strip Floors

After seeing the wood strip floor in the March/April 2015 *CorvanAntics*, I just had to share my idea for installing a wood strip floor. I wanted my wood to be removable so I could use my truck for something other than shows. I've had my wood floor in my 1961 Rampside for over three years now. I take it out so my grandkids can ride in the back for parades. I used Velcro on my wood strips and, as shown in the enclosed pictures, the strips are numbered so they can go back in as originally installed. The engine compartment strips are the only ones that are permanent, as both sides of the lid have the wood strips. These were installed with small brass screws from the opposite sides. I have a thick rubber mat for the engine cover that I use for parades as this is a sitting down only area. All other strips can be removed as required.



Completed Winter Project

My big winter project was getting a fresh, long-awaited power train installed in the Greenbrier. Engine is a rebuilt 110 originally assembled back in 2009 using an "X" case married to a Powerglide and 3:27 diff.

In my case, it takes a village for a project like this...Engine compartment and van interior was painted last fall with the help of my buddy Freddy (that's it, just Freddy). Credit my good friend John Sweet (ie John's Corvair Parts) with much of the heavy mechanical lifting, including overall tutorial direction and hands-on power train prep. – I can't thank John enough for all the help and encouragement he's provided.

Tim Colson was able to provide a correct FC tranny cover and serviceable oil cooler pipes. Some minor pipe work required but otherwise all good to go and all Tim asked in return was that I make him a Corvair Spyder Hubcap Clock.

I already had the original FC tranny cooler but it was rather dinged up - my father-in-law Bill pointed me towards a \$6 Harbor Freight radiator rake to straighten up the cooler fins – very easy to do this .

Western PA Corvair Club member Jim Madden provided the powdercoating services for the engine shrouding – he does good work.

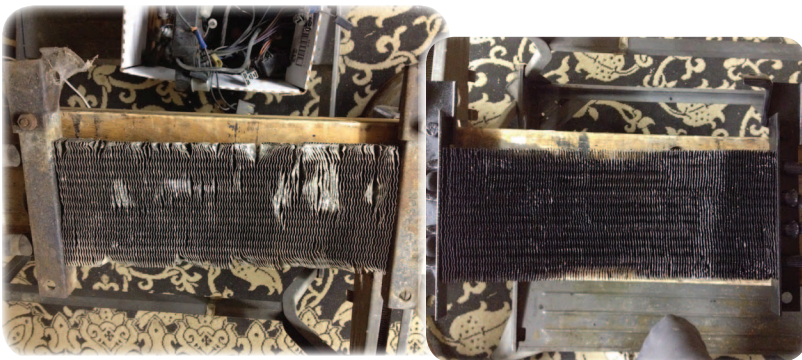
Then, on the day of actual installation, Three Rivers Corvairs buddies Kurt Foltz and Jim Weppelman stopped over to help – saying they are good guys is an understatement. Lots of subsequent work around the engine compartment followed, including installation of all the firewall pass-thru items, starter, tranny hookup, heater motor and lower shroud heater setup, etc. Still need to pickup a fresh battery, but otherwise It's pretty much all in at this point other than the exhaust, which is on hold pending final body prep and undercoating. Exterior paint is on track for sometime this summer.

Dainer's Rampside, Then and Now

In the May/June 2012 *CorvanAntics* newsletter I wrote about my fathers '62 Rampside. I had mentioned the brief history Dad had with it and how it was now in my garage getting a new restoration. My goal was to get it done so Dad could see it again finished. Dad was 87 and did not drive much. In recent years he managed to put almost 300 miles a year on the Rumpy but most of the time it just sat. I remember telling him the 110hp engine needed Premium gas and how he would tell me that every third tankful, he put in "good" gas! Obviously the bad gas was just worse so I would fill the tank with Premium most times I went up to visit him.

Well, progress on restoring it moved along as best as I could do while still working and taking every other weekend to drive the 100 miles north to visit him. The bodywork took lots of hours, as it does. I welded up all the drilled holes in the body that I did not want, such as mirrors, the antenna he had put on the drivers side, and the handles that did not belong. For some reason the engine lid cover in the bed had lots of drill holes. It took a lot of welding to get these all filled in and the metal worked out. There were also a lot of little rust pinholes that needed to be sand blasted and welded. Nothing serious, as this Rampside has spent it's entire life in Southern California. Dad did manage to nudge the workbench in his garage from time to time when he parked the Rampside and managed to nicely push the center ridge of the passenger's door stripe inwards about 3/4 inch. No crease, but a nice inward push. I didn't think I would be able to draw that one out, but after making a special tool, I was able to push the point of the stripe out perfectly from the inside.

The drivetrain is in good condition. The last time the engine was out was about 27 years ago. It's running fine but I want to clean it up and add forged pistons and a billet cam gear, along with rebuilt heads and other upgrades. So the engine will be next.

As I mentioned, the body was in remarkable condition. Another tough job was getting the two applications of Zolatone bed liner and several coats of paint out of the entire truck. I really like the clean look of a painted truck bed, so two and a half years of work getting ready for paint ensued. One panel at a time I stripped the Rumpy to a rolling body. All the removed parts were detailed or replaced. Thank goodness for a bunch of marked Zip Lock sandwich bags.

Without them, I would have never found everything to reassemble it. While redoing the bed I also added these red oak wood slats—an idea I got from Jay Leno's Rampside restoration. Please don't ask how many hours I have in this. It doesn't matter!

I sent it off to the paint shop last November and got it back just after New Years Eve. I was able to do all the re-assembly with NOS emblems, a new tinted windshield, Deluxe trim inside and out, S-10

front air dam, new custom upholstery (keeping the stock look) and stone guards on the headlights. These are the last pair Cal Clark had. His father made them and apparently no more will be made.

Unfortunately my Father passed away last year at the age of 90. I was able to show him in-progress pictures of

his truck but at the time of his passing, the Rampside was still a shell on wheels. I'm sure he sees it and can be proud that his little truck, which he enjoyed for about 27 years, is looking nice. I have built this Rampside as a tribute to Dad. In his childhood he was nicknamed "Dainer" by his brothers and sister so we call this little truck "Dainer's Rampside!" There are still a lot of things to detail, even before I do the engine,

but it's been a real joy. I don't plan on building "Dainer's Rampside" as a Concours truck. I have done that in the past with several Corvairs. But that won't stop me from entering it in that kind of event. We, the family, will in the mean time enjoy the truck at cruise nights, shows and just for fun. I'm proud to tell people, "This is my dad's truck."



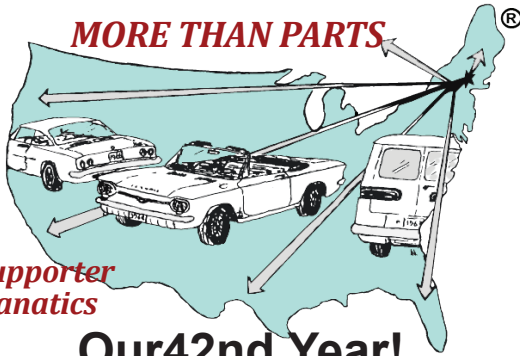
