

Ron's Big Show!

Last month's *Fifth Wheel* included a flyer for Ron Reles' 3rd Annual Great Phillipsburg Auto Show. It was scheduled for Saturday July 8. If you didn't attend, you missed a good one.

Upon entering the show field, each entrant received a big goody bag plus free coffee and doughnuts. Later in the morning, the local Knights of Columbus cooked up burgers, dogs and sausage sandwiches with all the fixin's. Substantial door prizes were given away throughout the day. Although there were 64 cars in all, the judging was completed without a hitch and all the awards were presented by 2:30 PM.

Seven pretty Corvairs were on display. LVCC was represented by Tom Hambel and his '63 Monza sedan, Al Lacki and his '66 Monza coupe, Larry Lewis and his '64 Spyder convertible, and of course Ron and his '65 Corsa convertible.

The three additional Corvairs were exhibited by Warren Minchin Sr., who brought out his very clean '63 Corvair 700 sedan, John Shoemaker, who exhibited his popular mid-engine V8 Corvair and Jay Corley, who arrived in his turbocharged '63 Rampside.

Ron's show is special because it is a judged show that includes a Corvair class. Larry walked away with a 1st place trophy, Ron with 2nd and Al with 3rd. But the scoring was close and, aside from the Corley's Rampside (his daily driver), all the Corvairs placed with a few points of each other.

Naturally, there were dozens of other cars at the show and trophies were awarded to the top three cars in each class. There were nineteen different classes in all. In addition to the usual Corvettes and muscle cars, there were some unusual entries including a 1933 Packard 1006 phaeton, a 1929 Model 75 Chrysler four-door sedan, a 1930

Ford Model A 3-passenger coupe, a 1914 Ford Model touring car and four competition vehicles including a very rare 1958 Gemini Formula Junior race car made in England.

Of course, the Corvairs were the nicest of all.

Corvair's 5th Birthday By Charles C. Cain

Editor: Here's a historic article that was written up by a United Press author in Detroit. We know it appeared in the July 16, 1964 issue of the Corsicana Daily Sun from Corsicana, Texas. It probably appeared in other newspapers as well. A great retrospective!

The Corvair. America's only rearengine production car celebrated its fifth birthday last week almost as quietly as it was born. Sales reports at Chevrolet Division of General Motors show that nearly 1,250,000 Corvairs have been sold since the first production model rolled off the Willow Run, Michigan, assembly plant on July 7, 1959.

The auto industry has always kept a veil of secrecy around its new cars until public introduction time, but it is doubtful if any auto maker exceeded the cloak and dagger methods GM used when it brought cut the Corvair.

<u>Early Secrecy.</u> Workers on the preliminary job had to remove all Chevy insig-

nia from their coveralls and other equipment so no one would know exactly what they were working on. Bids for materials were asked in the name of Holden, S.A., GM's Australian branch, so other auto firms would not get an inkling of the fact that Chevrolet was planning a new car.

The idea for a small car - GM never refers to its products as Compacts - jelled after Volkswagen had such success in the American market right after World War II. The Corvair project had interested GM engineers since 1949, but it was not until 1952 that the first definite moves were made. That was after Edward N. Cole, now a General Motors vice president, directed GM's tank building operations at Cleveland during the Korean conflict.

Cole, whose talents included engineering and test driving ability, became more and more interested in the Corvair project as he watched rear-engine tanks roll off the Cleveland line. Cole went on to become chief engineer and later general manager of Chevrolet, a job now held by another Corvair enthusiast, Semon E. Knudsen, GM vice president.

Given Go Ahead. Work on the project continued through the years and in May, 1957, GM leaders on the corporate level gave the go-sign to the Corvair idea. Cole explained, "a clear and present need had arisen for a special type of car, designed to provide American standards of performance, comfort, safety and convenience but in a smaller size, at a lower first cost and with improved operating economy." The original production Corvair was a four-door, six-passenger sedan on an 108-inch wheelbase, with an air cooled six cylinder rear engine. It had few extras and was aimed at the buyer who wanted a low priced car without a lot of options.

In the intervening years, lot of changes have taken place in the Corvair. It no longer is a plain Jane, but instead a luxury small sports car. Its 1960 Monza began the bucket-seat boom that swept the industry. Today, the Monza models

take nearly 80 per cent of all Corvair sales. And customers like to further dress Corvairs with optional equipment such as white sidewalls (currently 76 percent), wheel covers (83 per cent), tinted glass (50 per cent), radios (61 per cent) and even air conditioning which is found in more than 3 percent of Corvairs. The basic engine has been upped to 95 horsepower and options up to 150 are available.

Now established, the Corvair offers eight models, including the Greenbrier sports wagon and is a well established member of the Chevrolet family. GM, which keeps extremely close checks on the buying market, reported 43 percent of Corvairs are owned by multi-car families, 18 per cent by women and 34 per cent by motorists under age 35. Thus it showed a definite appeal to the two-car families and to the so called youth group.

One of the most surprising things about Corvair is that its basic appearance has changed little since the first one was shown five years ago. There have been changes in engineering and in interiors and equipment. Industry sources are convinced this will change in the fall when Chevrolet brings out its 1965 models. Expectations are that the Corvair will undergo its first major styling changes.

Knudsen said of the current market: "The Corvair has a market all of its own because of its basic design and performance features. It has created tremendous owner loyalty, particularly among professional people. It is going into the finest homes in the country as a second and third car. We believe the Corvair is in tune with the characteristics of the expanding future auto markets. Its sales outlook for the next few years is excellent."

One way to irritate a Chevrolet official is to ask him when Chevy is going to bring out a car to match Ford's new Mustang. One replied, "Mustang is just catching up with Corvair now...they are matching us, so, it is not a case of our matching them."

Corvair officials get a gleam in their eyes when you ask them about their '65 models, but they will tell you little. They seem satisfied however that the new Corvair line will corral the Mustang.

RUBBER PARTS AND MODERN GASOLINE

Editor's Note: This tech article appeared in the December 2002 issue of the CORSA Communique and remains relevant today. Corvairs have two short rubber hoses that serve as connectors between the main fuel lines, which are made of steel tubing. Although the are only a few inches long, the rubber hoses can and do degrade over time, especially with gasoline

spiked with ethanol. And when they degrade, then can leak or collapse, causing poor engine performance. It is wise to inspect and, when necessary, replace them. Are there different kinds of hose? You bet!

Many areas of the country are now requiring seasonal use of oxygenated gasoline. Additives include MTBE, ETBE, or TAME. The stated purpose is to reduce air pollution, but whether or not these fuels reduce pollution is under debate. The crucial thing is that these fuels can have adverse effects on the fuel systems of older cars.

Some rubber hoses are fine with the new fuels, some are not. Nitrile has some problems, silicone is okay. Viton, used for carburetor inlet needle tips, can be softened by ethanol.

Old fuel hose marked SAE 30R7 may harden or get soft with oxy fuels. Replace all flex lines in your car with fuel injection hose marked SAE 30R9. It is proof to 900 psi and is compatible with all fuels. Use worm-drive hose clamps, not the OEM spring clamps.

Use only metal inline fuel filters, not plastic.

Carry spare carburetor needles/seats, or rebuild carbs with kits using modern materials.

Mechanical fuel pumps should be regularly inspected for signs of leakage.

Fuel Hose Lowdown

Actually, there are different kinds of SAE 30R9 fuel hose. There are separate grades for low-pressure (carburetor) fuel systems, high pressure (fuel injection) fuel systems, and applications where the hose is submerged in the fuel tank. And there are several manufacturers.

For example, Gates offers its Barricade® line of fuel hose for carburetion systems. It meets SAE J30R14T1, EPA 40 CFR 1051.110, and CARB small engine off-road requirements and is approved for use with leaded and unleaded gasoline, diesel, bio-diesel, E-85, methanol, ethanol, and gasohol fuels. Gates recommends it for carbureted engines in cars, light trucks, off-road vehicles and small engines.

AC Delco also offers fuel hose that meets the SAE 30R9 standard. The 30R9 hoses offered by both Gates and AC Delco make use of "Green Shield" technology - a internal barrier that prevents the fuel from permeating through the hose and into the atmosphere - not

as a wet leak, but as a gas. It's an environmental thing.

Well, this seems like much ado for those little short hoses we find in the Corvair fuel system. If this stuff is so good, why not use it to replace those rusty steel lines inside your engine compartment? Don't do it!

Bare rubber hoses really have no place in the engine compartment of a Corvair. If and when your fan belt lets loose, it can destroy the hose and cause your fuel pump to shoot raw gasoline over your hot engine. The gasoline will puddle on the engine tin and likely ignite. If your fuel lines are shot, order a new set from Clark's or one of the other major Corvair parts suppliers. Or if you're handy with a tube bender, make your own.

NECC at Pocono

Sunday July 16, 2017. Northeast Corvair Council d/b/a NECC Motorsports at Pocono Raceway - South Course. 12 turns. 1.3 miles per lap. 8:30 AM to 5:00 PM. Perfect weather.

Thirty-one drivers went out for the High Performance Driving option. 16 for timed laps. Several more for the Taste of the Track option. The course consisted of Turn #1 of Pocono's "Tricky Triangle" - a 14 degree banked turn allowing truly high-speeds - and a

twisty combination of quick leftand-right infield corners.

And now, for some Corvair talk.... All the Corvairs broke except for Brian O'Neill's. Terry Stafford's, Dan Schmidt's, John Egerton's, Joe Salmastrelli's, and the former Gurdon Horner / Al Hilderbrand Corvair - Old #22. Terry and Dan's cars suffered internal engine damage. Egerton blew a main crankshaft seal. Salmestrelli wiped out the pinion gear in his diff (he's running a small-block V8 through a Corvair transaxle), and Old #22's extra-wide front tires were rub-

bing the bodywork under hard braking enough to peel rubber off the tire like a potato peeler.

Brian went out for the timed laps and completed all three. His engine started to overheat during the third lap so he had to slow down, but he made it.

A bunch of non-Corvairs broke down, too and weren't able to go out for timed laps.

I drove my Yaris and my lap times were third from slowest, but my engine only has 105 hp, so that was expected when competing against 600+ horse-power Corvettes, Camaros and Mustangs. And I had fun! Al Lacki
