Installing 15x7 Wheels on a 1964 Sedan By Bob Weideman

I first saw this set of wheels listed for sale last fall on the Corvair Trader Facebook page. They are 15x7 rims sporting 205/50/r15 tires. I saved the 'for sale' ad and spent a few months contemplating how to justify spending.

Tax return season was coming up and the wheels were still for sale, so I contacted the owner. He said he was sure they would fit my sedan but was willing to let me test fit them on my car before we finalized a deal.

EM sedans are notoriously hard to find aftermarket wheels that fit due to the way that the rear wheel tucks up inside the fender. I took a drive on Saturday Feb. 9th from Bethlehem Pa down to Moorestown NJ to meet with the owner and fit the wheels to the car. He was nice enough to have his floor jack and an air wrench out and ready to use.

We installed the rear wheel and it looked like it would clear in the fender; my biggest concern (more on the rear wheel fitment later). Next came the front wheel. Installed the wheel but found that the inside edge of the rim was hitting the steering arm, not allowing the wheel to sit flat against the drum. After some discussion with the owner about some possible solutions, I drive home without the wheels as I didn't want to shell out the cash for something I wasn't confident I could use.

Over the next week or two, I did some research asked a bunch a Corvair guys for ideas. The solution seemed to be switching to quick steering arms.

Great! Seems simple enough, time to buy the wheels. I even worked out a deal to avoid having to drive all the way back down to south Jersey, paid for the wheels with PayPal, and coordinated with Nick Gravino (who lives right around the corner from where the wheels were) to bring them along to the NJACE auction and pick them up from him there.

Next comes the search for quick steering arms. I find a local club member with a set of used ones he was willing to sell and made that exchange at the PCA Holiday Party.

So now that I had the wheels and the quick steering arms, it was time to plan a day to do the install. But springtime came along, work and life got busy and the months ticked by.

I finally made plans with a PCA club member who has an alignment machine in his shop to help me with the installation and a front-end alignment, since replacing the steering arms would mess with the alignment. We picked July 4th as the day. Normally we would be at the Quakertown Family Day Car Show, but since it was 90 plus degrees with a heat index of over 100, we decided that spending the day in his air-conditioned garage would be better than roasting at a car show.

Finally, the day arrived for the new wheel install. The plan was to jack up the front, swap the stock steering arms with the quick steering arms, install all four wheels, and align the front-end. Easy Peasy.

But no Corvair project is ever that easy. The front wheels came off and the stock steering arms came off with no issues. The quick steering arms installed easily too. Now we realized that the rivets in the front drums that hold the drum to the hub assembly didn't allow the rim to sit flush against the drum. We decided to remove rivets. This will also allow brake drum to be removed to service the front brakes the same way the rears work without removing the entire hub. We chiseled the rivet heads off and popped out the studs

with a punch and re-install everything on the front of the car.

At this point we thought we were ready to set up for the alignment. The car cames off the jack stands and sat nicely on all four wheels, but then we realized there is an issue in the rear.

We tried to bounce the car to see how the rear wheels moved inside the wheel well and found the rear suspension seemed to be locked up. Time to investigate.

We determined that the inside of the rim is tight up against the flange on the spring tower where the rubber bump stop is. A decision was made to pull out the torch and trim off the flange.

We removed the bump stops, trimmed off about an inch of metal and reinstalled the rear wheels. Everything now fits perfectly.

Finally, time for the final alignment! The alignment machine got hooked up to the wheels, the computer spat out some information, the adjustments were made to bring everything into tolerance, and finally we were done.






Rear Cover Gasket Prep by Rick Norris


The one thing of many things I like to do is cleaning parts . Yeah, its grunt work but for me it is a kind of Zen thing plus the feeling of accomplishment. It doesn't take much to keep me busy.

Scraping old gaskets off is no fun but we have all had to do it and along the way we develop our own techniques for getting the job done without destroying the sealing surfaces.

I learned a trick from an "old guy racer" which is to use grease instead of any sealer. It makes removal much easier. After all, the factory didn't use anything on gaskets.

One place I will use some special akenpucky is the rear cover. As we all know this is a prime area for leaks mostly





caused by over-tightening the lower engine mount nuts which helps the thin gasket surface do a die cut job on the gasket. Since I started using the better thicker gaskets from John Sweet, using proper torque and a good sealer I have no leak issues there.

On other thing I do is level the gasket sealing surface on the part itself. These things do get warped over time and misuse. I hit it lightly with a large flat file to take down the real high spots then I hone it by hand on a surface plate using some 400 grit wet or dry sand paper and WD40 as a lube.


