Fun Facts - 1969 Corvairs by Eva McGuire

All 1969 Corvairs were built at the Willow Run Assembly Plant (where most Corvairs were made) with the last car rolling out of the plant on May 14, 1969, at 1:30 PM. Out of a total 6,000 cars made in the last year of Corvair production, only 521 were convertibles.

There was only one convertible made on the last day of production and that was car #5997, frost green in color. Per my interview with Joe Casey, Supervisor of the Corvair Room at Willow Run (where they hand assembled the remaining 69 Corvairs after taking them off the main line in mid-November of 1968); they only chose to build one convertible in a selected day because as he stated, "They were a pain in the a\$% to make."

The first car to be hand assembled in the Corvair Room was car #2195 built on Friday, November 15, 1968. Cars 1 through 2,194 were made on the main assembly line.

Why did they take the 69 Corvairs off the main assembly line and hand assembled the rest? Because there was a high demand for Novas being made at that time. They were running 57 Novas an hour and only 2-3 Corvairs were coming down the line in that time.

Most workers were trained to assemble the Novas so it was difficult for them to deal with a random Corvair coming down (i.e. tools, etc.). They had issues of Corvair powertrains trying to be married to a Nova body and the engineers had a difficult time correcting that problem (according to Joe Strayhorn, Superintendent and Senior Reliability Engineer of the last 6,000 Corvairs made).

November Meeting

We met on Saturday November 19 in the library at the America on Wheels Museum. Larry Asheuer, John Egerton, Bob King, Allan Lacki, Bob Marlow, Dave Smullen, Jeff Strasser, Bob Weideman and Dick Weidner were there.

Dick Weidner read the minutes and treasury report. LVCC's bank account has a balance of approximately \$1,200.

Sad news: Scott Oberholzer won't be able to serve as LVCC's Vice President. He is just beginning chemotherapy. It was a surprise. Of course, we all wish him a full and effective recovery.

There was lots of discussion about members' Corvairs. Al Lacki and Larry Asheuer gave an update on the status of Greg Cain's CORSA coupe. It's at the Corvair Ranch awaiting an engine rebuild. The Powerglide transmission in Dennis Weaver's 1966 4door Monza seems to be stuck in first gear. John Egerton, Bob Marlow, Brian O'Neill and Al Lacki replaced the clutch and front main seal in Ron Peles' '65 convertible. The garages at Egerton's Farm served as the venue for the work on Ron's car.

Speaking of members helping members, Rich Greene discussed tech sessions held by the Philadelphia Corvair Club. The sessions are held at the owners' houses, not a central location. The owner supplies the parts and the tech squad brings the tools, just in case the owner doesn't have them.

Bob King said he has a set of special tools for disconnecting electrical connectors in GM cars, including Corvairs. He volunteered to bring them to our next meeting for show and tell. One of the members inquired about Schenkweiller's drive-in movie theater. In the past, the Philadelphia club held their movie night activity there. It is now under new management. Rich Greene said Philadelphia club will soon be deciding whether or not to do it again in 2023.

Mark your calendar! On behalf of LVCC, John Egerton volunteered to host a Corvair parts swap meet at his place on April 15. Bob Marlow agreed to get the word out to neighboring Corvair clubs. The event will likely include a 50/50 drawing, burgers and refreshments as well as a good assortment of parts for sale.

We also talked about having a Corvair show in the America on Wheels parking lot. Rich Greene expressed some concern that the show could draw too many cars to fit. It may be necessary to make it an invitational event, like the big concours shows.

Rich Greene talked about an upcoming exhibit at the America on Wheels Museum. The exhibit will run from October 2023 to April 2024 and the theme will be cars with air-cooled engines. Naturally, the curator of the museum would like to have one or two Corvairs on display. Other kinds of cars with air-cooled engines will also be invited. Jeff Strasser mentioned a friend who has a couple of air-cooled Franklins. Jeff will try to reach out to him to see if he is interested in putting them on display.

Last but not least, we discussed elections. We received no formal nominations, but at the meeting, two members stepped up to the plate. Al Lacki volunteered to be LVCC president and John Egerton volunteered to be Vice (Continued on page 4)

If You're Not Part of the Solution... by Bob Marlow

When my wife and I moved to Allentown in September, 2021, one of the first things I did was seek out the LVCC. At the time, LVCC had just begun meeting at the America on Wheels Museum, a beautiful facility and an easy 15-minute drive from my new home.

Having lived in New Jersey my entire life previously, and having been a member of the New Jersey Association of Corvair Enthusiasts for decades, I of course knew of LVCC and had attended Das Awkscht Fescht numerous times. I've known Al Lacki since the 1980s, Dick Weidner for even longer, and I've known a number of other LVCC members as well. So, while attending the meetings was new for me, I was not among strangers.

But – please forgive my candor here – I was disappointed. While the club members have all been welcoming, friendly, and generous, aside from the excellent and award-winning Fifth Wheel newsletter there appears to be no substance to the club. Other than the club's participation in Das Awkscht Fescht each year there are no events or activities. The meetings, while enjoyable socially, are pretty dull affairs.

This was a change for me coming from NJACE, where the club has a long history of well-attended meetings and a busy and varied calendar of events. I'm still the editor of that club's news-

letter. So I decided that I needed to try to make things better for LVCC. That's where the title of this article comes from, the phrase "If you're not part of the solution, you're part of the problem."

The greater Lehigh Valley region strikes me as rich soil for growing a healthier club. The overall automotive hobby is strong here, and there is a good number of Corvair owners throughout the area. We have within reach the ingredients to be bigger and better.

By happy coincidence, when I expressed my thoughts to longtime LVCC member John Egerton, he perked up and said that the club should hold a swap meet at his farm. Great idea! And a great way to begin to kick-start the club. When I spoke to Rich Greene, he suggested that the club consider having a Corvair-related event on the grounds of the AOW museum, another great idea! Rich, by the way, is part of the museum's volunteer staff, and it is he who makes our monthly meetings possible.

When I expressed my views publicly during the October LVCC meeting, those in attendance were in favor of reinvigorating the club. For my part, one of my suggestions was that we as a club join in with the Philadelphia club for their annual visit to Shankweiler's Drive-In. Shankwieler's, in addition to being the oldest continuouslyoperating drive-in theatre in the country, is located right here in the Lehigh Valley.

Hands-on tech sessions, as was done recently with Bill Geary's recentlyacquired Corvair, can not only be good for the club but can also help those new to Corvairs learn more about these unique machines. And I'd like to try to schedule a club visit to the showroom of the Eastern Auto Racing Historical Society in Orefield, where grassroots racing history from the Allentown Fairgrounds to Nazareth Speedway to Dorney Park and elsewhere is on display. Das Awkscht Fescht, of course, should remain a centerpiece event.

What about the meetings? Well, at the November meeting it was suggested that specific tech topics be planned for the meetings, whether basic or indepth, and I hope to push that idea forward. Also, I would like to find opportunities to get the club together over breakfast, lunch, or dinner, to provide greater social engagement and to draw in spouses and families.

I also hope to broaden regional participation, with our members attending activities conducted by neighboring clubs such as PCA, CPCC, and NJACE, and inviting those club's members to attend ours.

But none of this will happen if it's just me. We need more members to pitch in. With Dennis Stamm having expressed his wish to step down as LVCC President, Al Lacki has stepped up. Similarly, Fred Scherzer asked to not continue as vice-president, and Scott Oberholzer volunteered to serve in that position. But a serious medical diagnosis subsequently forced Scott to withdraw, which is totally understandable and we all wish the best prognosis for Scott. John Egerton then raised his hand and will now be our vicepresident for 2023. Dick Weidner will continue as secretary/treasurer.

Rich Greene will continue to facilitate our meetings at AOW. And me? I'll be an unelected activities coordinatorcheerleader. Please send your ideas/ recommendations/comments to me at rmarlow4040@gmail.com. My phone number, for voice or text, is 201-444-1859.

1966 Corvair Bike by Huffy

Rich Greene, editor of "Transmissions", the Philadelphia club's s newsletter, wrote: On October 29th Bob Weideman drove to Wilkes Barre to buy a Huffy Corvair bike for \$50. It is in good working order, and he rode it around his driveway before parking it in the garage. It even has the hard-tofind plastic headlight unit. Bob had purchased his first Corvair bike several years ago and had written a story for the 2017 February issue of Transmissions. Below you will find photos of his new bike and the story from 2017.

"I am continuing my research into the Huffy Corvair Bicycle. I first searched the internet and was only able to find pictures of the bikes, but no information on them. I then reached out to customer service at Huffy. Huffy responded via email.

"We have passed most of our older information onto a Bicycle Museum located in New Bremen, Ohio. Their website is www.bicyclemuseum.com".

Next, I searched through the museum's website and, while it contained a lot of good information, it didn't list the Huffy Corvair. I emailed the museum and waited patiently to hear back, figuring it was the holidays and it may take a while. After 2 weeks or so, I received this email from the Bicycle Museum:"

"Hi Bob,

I found the Huffy Corvair in our Huffy records. They only produced the Corvair model one year – 1966.

There was a men's 26 inch, boys 24 inch, ladies 26 inch and girls 24 inch. The men's' and boys' models had a black frame, chrome fenders and rims, black tank, black chain guard, black carrier, white seats and white hand grips and whitewall tires. The ladies and girls' models had white frames, chrome fenders and rims, blue tank, blue chain guard, blue carrier, white seats and white hand grips and whitewall tires.

Men's models featured Huffy's "Twin Arch" frame. Huffy said they were "Sonic Styled". That is all we have on the Corvair. Hope this helps you! John Boeke, The Bicycle Museum of America, 7 W. Monroe Street, New Bremen, Ohio 4586"






