July 2023 Meeting Minutes

Lehigh Valley Corvair Club Membership Meeting July 15, 2023 America On Wheels Museum Allentown, PA

The meeting took place in the AOW auditorium with 8 persons in attendance: Greg Dittrich, William A Dittrich, William D. Dittrich, Wesley Heiss, Allan Lacki, Scott Oberholzer and Dave Smullen. The meeting was called to order at 10:16 AM by President Al Lacki.

Minutes of our July 17 meeting and treasury report for the month of June were published in previous issue of the Fifth Wheel newsletter. They were approved here by acclamation of the members present.

During this meeting, we talked about a wide range of topics. Scott and Wes talked about Monza go-karts. Wes has one and Scott has two, one of which is a kiddie-ride body mounted to a Rupp chassis. Scott noted that a group in western Pennsylvania has a go-kart and mini-bike meet every year.

The discussion then turned to engines of all kinds. How much horsepower can you get out of an air-cooled Corvair engine? Greg recalled a souped-up 600 hp Volkswagen engine located in Hillsborough, NJ. Can a Corvair do that? Bill Sr. said his collection includes an antique lawn motor powered by a water-cooled one-cylinder hit-and-miss engine that relies on siphon-cooling rather than a water pump.

Yenko Stingers came up next. As it turns out, Greg used to own one. He said it was great fun. Punch it and it goes! He sold it seventeen years ago for an undisclosed sum.

Dave Smullen talked about treks in his Corvair to Watkins Glen to see vintage races. Typically held the week after Labor Day, this event attracts race cars of the 1920s and 1930s including Bugattis, Allards and much more.

Some people will go great lengths to store their antique car collection. Greg said his aunt and uncle are friends with a wealthy collector whose garage is a bunker with two-foot-thick concrete walls. The collection includes a Duesenberg valued at \$2.5 million, so maybe it's worth it.!

To cap-off the meeting, Al did a show-and-tell session by presenting his collection of Corvair books including Corvair Af-


Driving a Corvair Without Keys by Mike Dawson

Source: Here we have another informative tech article written by Mike Dawson. This particular article appears in the August 2023 issue of VairCor, the official newsletter of the Heart of America Corvair Association. It's part of Mike's Preventive Maintenance Series of tech articles posted at http://www.hacoa.org/index.php/technical

1. A useful little device that can be carried in your billfold (or purse) for gaining entry into any Corvair is the little spring clip that holds the air baffles up against the cylinders in all Corvair engines: about 3 ½ inches long with an eye on either end.

To open a wing window, gently push one end past the rubber under the vent handle with the eye to the rear of the car. Push in on the vent window and rotate the clip counter clockwise.

The vent handle will unlock and you can reach in to open the side window or door. This method is quick and will not damage anything.

2. The wiring for the Corvair starter operation begins at the battery, travels twenty plus feet through several connectors and switches (depending on transmission) to end up only two feet from the battery where it started.

To bypass all of that, run a jumper wire from the positive battery terminal to the purple wire in the two-wire connector found at the left front of the engine compartment. Unplug the connector and touch the jumper wire to the purple wire that leads through the rubber grommet in the sheet metal to the starter. Anytime you make the connection, the starter will engage.

The engine will only start if the key is on, so you can use this for compression checks, setting dwell, mechanical fuel pump testing etc. A commercial remote starter is a good tool to have. To actually run the engine, you need the next step.

3. During normal running, the coil receives less than six volts to the + terminal because of a resistance in the wiring (1.8 ohms). Full battery voltage is supplied only during the cranking to help starting under extreme conditions. If you apply 12 volts during running, the points will quickly burn and the engine dies.

To run an engine without using the ignition switch, make up a jumper as follows: cut a length of standard wire (any gauge from 12 to 20 will work) that reaches from the positive battery connection to the positive coil terminal. Attach a clamp or large clip for the battery end and a smaller clip for the coil + terminal end.

Purchase a coil resistor from a parts store (1.8 ohms is a standard listing) and attach it in series anywhere in the middle of the wire. Wrap it with tape because it gets hot to the touch.

You also could use the original resistance wire from another harness.

Anytime this jumper is hooked up, the engine will run until you unhook it. You cannot run other accessories with this jumper, only the ignition part of the engine. Also be sure you don't lay the wire against anything that moves when the engine starts. When I need to drive a locked car without keys, I use all three of the above.

Graphite Spark Plug Lube

Source: Here's an interesting article. Your editor has never heard of anybody using a special lube for installing spark plugs. What do you guys think? This article appeared in the August 2023 issue of Group Corvair's newsletter.

Corvair people and other owners of cars with aluminum cylinder heads would be interested to know that piston-engine aircraft manufacturers such as Lycoming and Continental all advocate the use of graphite lubricant for spark plugs used in aluminum cylinder heads. Even the FAA recommends graphite thread lubricant to prevent galled or stripped threads in aircraft engines.

Champion Spark Plug Company makes a liquid graphite-based spark plug thread lubricant that comes in a small bottle with an applicator brush inside that is similar to a bottle of finger-nail polish except the consistency of the liquid graphite is like a thick paint. This spark plug thread lubricant is intended to be applied each time spark plugs are removed and installed, usually at about 100-hour intervals in most piston-engine aircraft. The Champion Spark Plug lubricant can be purchased at most local aircraft service centers and aircraft supply stores. (\$11.50 at www.aircraftspruce.com.)



To prevent thread galling on our Corvairs, dress the threads on each new spark plug with a rotary wire brush to remove any manufacturing burrs, then use the thread lubricant before installing them in the cylinder heads. Even brand-new aircraft spark plugs often have burrs on their threads. We can't expect ours to be any better.

(The nuclear navy uses a lot of graphite lubricant on stainless steel and similar metal threads. Their version is a colloidal suspension of graphite in alcohol. One note! Don't get graphite lubricant on you or your clothes. It WILL NOT wash out. About the only thing that will dissolve graphite is molten iron...)

Counterpoint! Here is a quote from several of the reviews on the Aircraft Spruce website:

"I just talked to the Tech Support guys at Lycoming and I was told that the factory uses Loctite C5-A copper anti-seize. Ref: Lycoming Service Instruction No. 1042AG, Use a copper-based anti-seize compound or engine oil on spark plug threads starting two full threads from the electrode, but DO NOT use a graphite-based compound.

Check those Secondaries on 140 Engines by Seth Emerson

Source: Here's another article that appeared in the August 2023 issue of Group Corvair's newsletter.

This is from Seth Emerson via the Northern Virginia Corvair Club HAM. "In 1967, I bought my first Corvair ('65 Corsa convertible) from a Chevy dealer "OK Used Car" lot. About 20k miles on it. I drove it for several months. Whenever I drove it on the highway at "enthusiastic" speeds, it would run hot. As I delved into modifications on the car, I decided to rebuild the secondaries, which looked fine on the outside. I found ½" of water in each, on top of ¼" of solid gunk on the bottom of the float bowls. No fuel had passed through those carbs in many, many miles. The carbs passed air but no fuel – I wonder why it ran hot when those secondaries were open? Lean, anyone?"

"Always check out the secondaries on seldom-driven 140 motors. Tip – remove the air filter housing and aim a connected timing light down the throat of the carb. At idle – and off idle – the flash of the timing light will freeze-frame fuel flow in place allowing you to see if fuel is passing through and if the accelerator pumps are working."
