It has happened too many times before. The Bonanza was torn down. The Ground Round was remodeled into a Fuddruckers with the meeting room eliminated. September's converted to a go-go bar before going belly-up. The Pronto Deli folded.

At the location of the Cruisin' Diner, two previous incarnations at which we held our meetings also failed to survive, the Oasis Diner and the Hong Kong Buffet.

NJACE, it appears, is the kiss of death for the restaurant business!



In this instance, however, it came as no real surprise, as the Cruisin' Diner had been unable to attract sufficient business and repeatedly shot itself in the foot with poor service and uneven quality.

It's a shame, however, because the central location was ideal for us and the car-themed decor suited us perfectly.

Nelson, the manager, was an upbeat, friendly fellow who was a "car guy" himself and who was welcoming to clubs like ours. So we tolerated the slow service and the unpredictable quality.

But failure is all-too-common in the restaurant business, and the Cruisin' Diner appears to have joined the ranks of those that have failed.



So, Now What?

Boldly, the NJACE officers got together and checked out the nearby **Empire Diner on Route 46 in Parsippany**. This diner, while not offering the fully private meeting space that we enjoyed at the Cruisin' Diner, is a long-established and successful diner with a good and varied menu, and it is easy to get to.

On the day that the officers visited the food and service were both good and the manager was happy to schedule monthly breakfasts. As a result, beginning this month the Empire Diner is where we will meet for breakfast on the first Saturday (April 5 this month).

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The address is **1315 U.S. 46, Parsippany, NJ 07054**. This is on the eastbound side, a short distance east of I-287, and easy to get to from I-80 or I-287.

The meeting location may have changed but the day and time have not: Saturday morning, beginning at 9:00 AM.

Spring is here, so dust off the Corvair and join us at the Empire Diner this Saturday.



April Tech Session

Immediately following our breakfast this Saturday at the Empire Diner we will have a club Tech Session at the body shop in Flanders. This tech session has a central theme of not a car but just an engine!

My 1966 Turbo 180 engine will be the primary focus. It is on the engine run stand, and after about ten years of storage after the rebuild, it is now a running engine. The first oil change has already been completed, and we will adjust the valves, synchronize the carburetors (yes there are two on this engine), and check the timing. At the same time we will make sure that all the systems of the run stand are working as intended.

If the weather is good to us, we will be doing this outside, but if the weather is less than ideal we will be inside the shop.


Tech Session April 5 Ashley's Auto Body 274 Hillside Avenue, Flanders, NJ

Even though a turbo engine has only one Carter carburetor in its stock setup, it would be difficult at best to accomplish what we are doing without first breaking it in with a pair of stock Rochester carbs instead of the full turbo setup.

This engine was built for my Corsa convertible, and eventually that car will ready for it. But the short term (who knows how long) plan with this engine is to install it first in my Rampside, to get the truck back on the road and to fully break in the engine. By the time the convertible is ready there will be mileage on the engine.

Also on the docket for Saturday is installing new engine compartment insulation in Nick Ford's 1967 Monza, not a difficult job at all but one made much easier with help.

There are no other defined goals for this tech session, but as always anyone is welcome to drive their 'Vair and if an issue exists we can check it out. If it is a simple fix, it might be attempted right then and there. If not, a future tech session can be planned.



My hope this year is to get more members cars running properly(including my own). There are always a number of issues, minor and major, that can be addressed at one of our tech sessions. Theese are not just mechanical issues either. They can be engine cooling, electrical, weatherstrips, trim, door and lid alignment, exhaust replacement and upgrade (duals on any Corvair!), suspension, the heating system, and others.

Don't hesitate to contact me with anything that you may want to tackle at a tech session. You may be surprised at how easy it really is. Of course there are limits to what we can accomplish in a day, but let's see what can be done for you. My email is lashley327@optonline.net.

Cherry Blossom Time by Rob Wanthouse

You hear a lot about the cherry blossoms in Washington, DC, each year, but you don't have to go to the nation's capital to take in the beauty of springtime cherry trees. You can do so right here in New Jersey, and that will be the point of our **April Driving Tour on Saturday, April 26**.

The tour will begin at the famous Six Brothers Diner located at 475 US 46, Little Falls. This is one the eastbound side, less than half a mile before the Route 3 split.



We will drive first through Montclair State College, in our further attempt to teach these kids what cool vehicles look like.




Will make our way to Branch Brook Park in Newark, yes, Newark, where you will find a 360-acre expanse that stretches nearly four miles from US Route 280 in Newark northward to Mill Street in Belleville, and which averages a quarter-mile in width. The park includes vast lawns, playing fields, winding paths, streams, pools and lakes. Branch Brook Park Lake alone covers 24 acres, and throughout the park there are 19 unique bridges over the waterways.



Branch Brook Park was designed by Frederick Law Olmsted Sr. in 1867. He is the same fella who did NYC's Central Park. The park's 4000 cherry trees should be in full bloom at that time. By comparison, the area around Washington, DC's Tidal Basin has 3,750 cherry trees. Branch Brook Park has the largest collection of Japanese flowering trees in one location in the United States.

Bordering the park is the 5th largest Gothic-Style cathedral in the United States, the Basilica of the Sacred Heart. This will be our last stop before lunch.



So meet us for departure from the Six Brothers Diner at 10 AM on Saturday, April 26. Hope to see you there!
