Long-time NJACE member Ron Peles served as Show Chairman for the **2nd Annual Great Phillipsburg Auto Show** held on **Saturday**, **August 13**. In addition to being a member of our club, Ron is Grand Knight of Knights of Columbus Warren Council 474. Together, Ron and his fellow Knights ran the show and, as promised, it included a special class just for Corvair. Proceeds from the show went directly to Saint Anne's Center, also known as "Grandma's House."

Ron and I entered our Corvairs, of course, as did Joe Maurella and Neil Franks. So, in total, we had four Corvairs on display at this show. Howard and Sherrie Horne were there, too, displaying their AACA HPOF 1987 BMW 325i.

You may recall that August 13 was a scorcher of a day, with record temperatures and a heat index of 115 degrees. Yeoww!



Needless to say, the blistering heat, in combination with a forecast for late afternoon thunderstorms, affected turnout. Forty-two cars registered, which wasn't bad, but Ron was hoping for more. It's worth noting that the show was held on a lush grassy lawn – a much nicer setting than an asphalt parking lot.

Notwithstanding the weather, this show, which is only in its second year, was organized very well and ran like clockwork. Registration proceeded without a hitch, generous door prizes were awarded, good music was provided, and great food was prepared on the spot by the Knights of Columbus. The Knights also erected a number of large EZ-Up canopies to provide spectators and car owners some muchappreciated protection from the vicious heat.

Cars were judged by a crack team led by Tom Falanga, Lance Huff Greg Roser, and me. Scores were tallied up by computer. Judging began early, at 10:30 AM, and was finished by noon. Upon receiving the results, the Knights assembled the trophies and Ron announced the awards. Everything was completed by 1:30 PM, which enabled spectators and owners to leave before keeling over from the heat!

Now, for the best part: Joe Maurella won not one but two trophies. His gorgeous '66 Corsa convertible came in first in the Corvair class. He also won the "Joan's Pick" trophy; Joan being the driving force behind the establishment of Grandma's House.

Ron Peles and I also received trophies for our Corvairs and Howard and Sherrie received a trophy for their BMW.

Grandma's House is located on twenty-two acres of property next to Saints Philip and James Elementary School in Phillipsburg. When it opens, it will provide shelter and care for pregnant and homeless women with children. All women regardless of race, religion, age or marital status will be welcome.

The facility, which is currently being prepared for occupancy, is 15,860-square-feet in size with three floors and a basement. Originally built as a convent in 1965, there are 33 rooms, shared bathrooms, two kitchens, multiple living rooms,

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and a chapel. The building sits on 22 acres of land in Phillipsburg, New Jersey, adjacent to St. Luke's Hospital. While engineers have assessed this solid- brick building as structurally sound, it has been abandoned for seven years resulting in multiple needed renovations.

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Round Tuit Part 1 of 5 by Frank Hunter

All of us have that one (or more) projects that keeps getting put off. I have a 1966 "Rust Red" Monza that has been sitting in the garage for quite some time. To be honest it moved into the garage in 1989 when we purchased our home in Ramsey. This car is so special that when we had our garage built a few years ago, it was stored inside while all the other cars waited outside.

I've owned it for over 30 years and pulled the powertrain out over ten years ago. Although I tried several times, I could not get the transmission side cover to go on correctly. The problem is two forks on the side of the transmission cover must be inserted into the transmission shaft along with the reverse adjuster at the bottom of the cover. The car would not shift into any gear, but it rolled just fine. Rolling is OK but shifting would be better!

I will not go into any further details of my multiple unsuccessful trials to fix the shifting problem. That said, two years ago another attempt was made but now the engine would crank but not start! Tim Schwartz and I replaced almost every ignition part from my running '67 4-door, but still could not get it to fire. The patient then went back into the garage for another two years.

This year I was determined to make another attempt. I drained the old gas and removed the tank, which had been cleaned in the 1990's. The tank was in good shape and new sealer was added. A review of the underside of the car for rust showed areas painted last were in good shape, however what was not painted needed POR15 and paint. After that the patient was pushed outside, an "incorrect" battery (ask David Main) was installed and was found to be still good though two years old.

I called Steve Calandra for help as I suspected we would have the same "parts" exchange as the previous repair attempt. Steve used his volt tester and found that the coil wires were attached incorrectly and that there was an additional "unknown" and unnecessary wire connected. The car started right up, and we made some carb, timing and dwell adjustments and the car idled fine.

Next month I'll tell you about the test drive.

All Air-Cooled Gathering Sunday, September 18

Bring your Corvair to the All Air-Cooled Gathering, sponsored by the Central Jersey Volkswagen Society on Sunday, September 18, at the Swim and Sport Club of Flanders. The is a large and largely hidden park located just a short distance from Ashley's Auto Body.

Corvairs – and all air-cooled cars – are welcomed at this well-attended and well-organized event. It actually covers both Saturday and Sunday but Sunday is the best day for Corvairs to participate.

The show is very hospitable to non-Volkswagens – in 2013, a Corvair, Allen Bristow's 1964 Greenbrier Camper, won Best-of-Show overall. Every year there is a feature vehicle, and this year it is Dune Buggies.

In addition to a show of more than 250 air-cooled vehicles, this event includes VW valve cover racing, kids games, 50/50, a swap meet, and the you-gotta-see-it-to-believe-it "Dub Push." There will be trophies, dash plaques, door prizes, on-site bar, kitchen, live music, special guests and a whole lot more.

Everyone is encouraged to enter the show, daily drivers to show cars, early or late model.

As long as it's an air-cooled, it's welcome. A portion of the proceeds will go to help support Operation Jersey Cares, an all volunteer organization that provides care and support for past and present NJ Combat Veterans.

Entrance to the show on Sunday – \$15.00 per person, including your car. Kids 12 and under are admitted free, and since this is a family event, there is no BYO alcohol permitted. As for pets, the event organizers have now instituted a pet policy which you can find on the event web site, http://www.allaircooledgathering.com

While you are free to arrive when you wish and depart when you choose, we are planning a pre-show meetup at Ashley's Auto Body so that we can caravan the one mile to the show site and all roll in together. 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Mr. Koehler's Corvair

Editor's Note: Earlier this summer the Automotive Hall of Fame in Michigan inducted four new honorees, one of whom was a somewhat controversial choice: Ralph Nader. This is the story of a car that was on display at the time of the induction ceremony, followed by the story of a different car related to the first.

As many who attended our 2016 Induction Ceremony may have noted, there was a Corvair on display for Ralph Nader's induction into the Hall of Fame. The car, which was an un-restored 1960 sedan, is owned by local Corvair collector Peter Koehler. It is one of hundreds that he has owned in 48 years of collecting Corvairs, and one of the most storied in his collection.

Mr. Koehler has quite the sense of humor about the Corvair's often dubious reputation "It's extremely rare, it's actually a Canadian build", Mr. Koehler said during a phone interview. "It is one of oldest Canadian-built Corvairs known to exist." The car was initially sold to a dealer in Ontario and bought by the local butcher, who sold the car back to the dealer in 1972. "The dealer kept the car in stock because there was very little trade in value. It stayed there until the very late 80's when I bought it. I've actually owned that car three times.'

Before Mr. Koehler bought the car, it had a rather unconventional role. "I've got the only Corvair that was a birthday cake" he said laughing. "There's weld splatter on the glass because the dealership used it as a parade float. They built a metal framework around the car and made it into a birthday cake. When they welded it up they covered the metal but they forgot to cover the glass and they burned it."

Though this Corvair's journey into Koehler's collection was an interesting one, its trip to the induction was perhaps the most difficult. "When we first started talking about displaying the car I was healthy," said Koehler, "I had no idea I was going to have a heart attack before this event happened." Mr. Koehler suffered a heart attack

on June 16th. "64 years and one month to the day and the heart said 'I'm tired of this I don't want to play anymore.' I was in the hospital for four days... I'm very happy I was able to survive it. Every day since has been a gift so I'm trying to do the best I can."

Though he was recovering, Mr. Koehler was still willing to bring his Corvair to the Induction. "I was perfectly happy to loan a Corvair out because that promotes the Corvair hobby. I wish I had not gotten sick and could have gone to the event, but it was all I could do to get the car to the location." Even after nearly half a century of collecting, Koehler is still passionate about the Corvair hobby and introducing them to younger generations. "It's inexpensive enough that I really don't use my household income. It's a good way to have fun on a budget and it doesn't negatively impact any other part of my life. And the grandkids love Corvairs, so that's even better."

In a subsequent posting on the AHoF web site, the organization noted:

Once again, the Hall of Fame has received overwhelmingly positive feedback from the Induction Ceremony. There were many highlights to choose from the show this year, but one of our personal favorites was Ralph Nader posing for a photo-op with the Corvair that was provided by owner Peter Koehler, a local Corvair collector and enthusiast, who was proud to display his Corvair for Nader's Induction. "I chose it carefully", said Mr. Koehler, "It is 99% stock and original. The main feature of this car is that it does not have any grass stains on the roof", he said jokingly.

Now, Pete himself adds a fascinating follow-up story:

Anybody interested in buying a 1962 Corvair? You won't believe who the seller is. When I went back to the Cobo Center in downtown Detroit to collect my 1960 Corvair that was lent to the Automotive Hall of Fame for their event, Ralph Nader was there. And I did get a chance to chat with him. He amazed me by identifying my car as a Canadian build! How about that? He also mentioned that he has a rough '62 Corvair back in Connecticut that he wanted to sell. Now who would want to buy a Corvair formerly owned by Ralph Nader (or at least owned by the organization that runs his Tort Museum in his hometown of Winsted)? I gave Ralph my contact info and he promised to have his guy at the museum contact me.

This Corvair was never driven by Ralph. It was given to him many years ago when the museum was in the planning stages, and he just stored it in a garage in Winsted, CT where it is still hiding today. When the Tort Museum was opened a few years back they purchased a nice 1963 (with an incorrect 1964 hood) Monza coupe for display. Ralph described the '62 as "rough." Judging from the pictures his Executive Director sent me, he was telling the truth.

My plan is make the car operational and fix the oil leaks so it doesn't make a mess on the museum's freshly painted floor. No plans at the present to change the car's patina. What do you think?

The Northeast Corvair Council / NECC Motorsports invites you to a full day of high-performance driving at New York Safety Track (NYST) on Saturday, September 24. 
Seen on the Street
