34 Arrested in Plot to Steal Enzo Ferrari's Remains

Modena, Italy -- Italian State Police have confirmed that they foiled a plot to steal the casket and remains of legendary Formula One racing pioneer Enzo Ferrari from a tomb near Modena, Italy. It's presumed they planned to demand a ransom from the Ferrari family for the return of the body.

Ferrari, founder of the company that produces some of the world's fastest and most expensive cars, died in August 1988 at age 90 after making the company famous around the globe.

Investigators in Nuoro, on the island of Sardinia, said 34 people had been arrested after the plot was discovered during an investigation into arms and drug trafficking. The accused belonged to the Anonima Sequestri, a Sardinian criminal organization that has a history of kidnap-for-ransom crimes.

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
