

Meeting Minutes January 21, 2007 Meeting ...

The meeting was held at Betty Smith and Don Vair's home in Pittsford. Thanks to Betty and Don for being excellent hosts and sharing their warm and welcoming home with club members.

Vice President Jim Bartasevich (with the Prez's help) the meeting called to order:

- The 4-Clubs 2007 Mini-Convention's sponsoring club has been changed from the ACORNS to the Buffalo Club. Plans are currently being developed using lessons learned from the National Convention last year. It appears the most likely location for the September event will be the Clarion Hotel in Blasdell, NY off the Thruway at exit #58. Confirmation information will be provided as it is released.
- The Syracuse Club is again planning to sponsor their annual "Recall" Corvair event on the first weekend in June. The new club president, Dave Robinson, is developing the base plan with location and details to follow. Keeping with the 4-Club spirit of Corvair support the Acorn's will provide support as required.
- The Acorn's will develop and host the 2008 4-Clubs Mini-Convention in Rochester. Dave Ellis has submitted a draft of the key milestones and time lines to make this activity as seamless as possible. George Renz suggested we utilize the Rochester Convention Bureau to support this activity. They can be helpful in locating hotel, other facilities and publicity. The organizing committee will be formed in the near future. We are looking for ACORN club members to help in this process. The task will be made easier based on the experience from the National Convention last year. Dave has agreed to manage the Valve Cover Race.
- Dave Ellis distributed a detailed trend analysis of Corvair prices from the 2005 to 2007 time frame. The summary is reproduced on pages 4 and 5 of this issue. It was noted that Mr. Jackson of the Barrett-Jackson Classic Car Auction Company has stated that the Corvair is under valued and he sees tremendous growth potential for the Corvair in the future.

The December 2006 issue of the Corsa Communiqué had an excellent article about the Fitch Exhibit held last summer at the Saratoga Auto Museum. If you are looking for an enjoyable trip, winter or summer, take a ride to Saratoga, New York and take in the wonderful sights. The City of Saratoga takes you back in time to an era when wealthy New York City people came to play in this upstate community. The horse race track, the arts and the marvelous homes are examples of these long ago times. One of the downtown hotels has maintained all the glory of the 1930's (with all the modern conveniences added). The elegant mansions with carriage houses, iron gates and vast gardens present a picture of silent movie days. Some streets are lined with carriage houses separated from the main house so the sight of these majestic homes would not be cluttered with mundane facilities. Today many of these carriage houses have been converted to wonderful and expensive homes. The Auto Museum resides in the same 2,500 acre park that is the home of the Saratoga Performing Arts Center. This is the summer home for the NY City Ballet and the Performance Shell, (This venue is at least twice as large as the remodeled Canandaigua Performance Center). The park is the home of the famous mineral springs and spas built in the 20's and 30's. You can still swim in the public mineral spring pool and enjoy the continually flowing spring water. If golf is your game, the park offers one of the most eye-catching courses in the northeast. Hotels and motels are numerous with the Gideon Putnam Resort & Spa located in the park; one of the oldest and well maintained lodge style hotels in the region.

This summer the Saratoga Auto Museum will run an exhibit called "Barn Finds".

Membership Dues

 I brought this salad to the January planning meeting, and several people asked for the recipe. The key to this salad is the freshness of the ingredients; I've tried substituting reconstituted lemon juice, pre-ground pepper, store-bought croutons etc..., and it just isn't the same. I've been told that this is the recipe for the original Caesar salad, as served at Caesar's Restaurant in Mexico City in the 1920's. So, the Caesar salad is actually a Mexican dish! It was NOT invented by Julius Caesar, nor was it first prepared by Imogene Coca and served to Sid Caesar backstage on Your Show of Shows. Aah, urban legends...

The Original Caesar Salad

1 clove each of garlic and shallot, pressed
1/3 cup olive oil
8 anchovy fillets cut up, or equivalent amount anchovy paste
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
½ tsp salt
¼ tsp dry mustard
½ tsp fresh ground pepper
Juice of fresh, ½ lemon
1/2 cup grated cheese, preferably blend of Parmesan and Romano
Yolk of 1 coddled egg
1 large bunch of fresh romaine lettuce, broken into bite-size pieces
Homemade garlic croutons (see below)

Combine garlic, shallot, olive oil, anchovy, Worcestershire sauce, salt, dry mustard, and pepper in the bottom of large bowl. Add romaine pieces and toss. Combine coddled egg yolk and lemon juice, then pour over lettuce and toss again. Add half the grated cheese and toss again. Add croutons and toss once more, then sprinkle remaining cheese over top of salad and serve.

Garlic croutons:

Pre-heat oven to 400 degrees. Trim crusts from 4 bread slices, then cut each slice into approx. 1-inch square cubes and place on cookie sheet. Sprinkle bread cubes with garlic powder and grated cheese. Melt 1/3 cup of butter or margarine till liquid, and pour evenly over bread cubes. Bake for 8-9 minutes, turn bread cubes over and bake for another 5-6 minutes. Allow croutons to cool on cookie sheet, uncovered, for at least one hour before serving.
