Chapter Chatter By Rory Clark

Rita and I hosted the July meeting and we could have not have asked for better weather. The only issue was heavy traffic on the beltway at the approach to the Cabin John (American Legion) bridge. Rita and I have experienced this many times so we feel for everyone who made the trek from Virginia. All in all, it was a good turnout so thanks to those of you who made it. We also managed to work on the Corsa and Rampside by splitting into teams.

Earlier in the week I found two new throttle shafts in the Corsa glove compartment. I knew the shafts were worn on the Rampside carbs but I was waiting until I had a bigger order before buying them from Clark's.

I managed to get one shaft out without issue. However, the other shaft put up a fight. One butterfly screw broke off when trying to remove it. That led to having to drill it out so the butterfly could be removed. Then the screw that holds the armature to the accelerator pump wouldn't

budge so I ended up grinding off the brass (bronze?) glob on the other side of the shaft so I could slide the shaft out from the opposite side. I was then able to remove the stuck screw.

Installation was really easy although I tried my best to install the shafts the wrong way on both carbs. Nothing would line up until I realized there is a left and right side and I needed to turn the shafts around.

After they were assembled all the adjustments that were made with the worn shafts had to be set again. I managed to finish them as everyone was arriving.

Team A worked on the driver side rear window. It needed some adjustments as it was too far forward when up and the driver's window would overlap the chrome trim piece on the rear window and not the rubber. The rear window also had a big golf ball sized gap at the lower rear when in the up position and it also had a terrible rattle to it. The team did a great

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job on adjusting the window front to back and they appeared to have the rattle sorted until my test drive proved otherwise. I will look into the rattle further as time permits but I will take the adjustment as a big win.

Team B worked on installing the carbs on Rampside. Once the carbs were on and after we removed the extra gaskets (totally my mistake) the cross shaft and associated linkage went on. Next, my brother, Dane, and I bent a fuel line to replace the damaged one on the right side of the engine. I am glad that I do not make fuel and brake lines for a living. You basically have one attempt to get it right.

Next came the distributor cap and then the plug wires, which I need to replace. I did not have a battery or enough rubber hose to run from the main fuel line to a gas can so I improvised. I connected my jump box to the battery cables and used starting fluid in the carbs. At this point it was Dane, Lee, and me remaining (Gary made it shortly afterwards) and, to our surprise and delight, the engine cranked over and fired.

Unfortunately there was not enough power in the jump box to keep it cranking but that test was enough to bring optimism that the engine will start and run.

The accelerator pedal cable appears to be binding and I think it is from 10 years of sitting outside without being used. I squirted lubricant into both ends of the cable but it is quite long so that effort was feeble at best. I plan on removing it and soaking it in oil so it moves freely. The list of things to fix stays constant but I feel that we are making decent progress.
