Articles of Interest

Continuing with the monthly series, the article below is the third in the series. I ran across this article from the December 24, 2015 edition of Autoweek - <u>Economy, Excitement and WHAT!</u>

There is mention of a Sidewinder rocket of all things.

The article starts off in 1960 defining how US automakers came up with an economy car. It was basically a full-size car that was shrunken to fit on a 100-inch chassis. Several examples

are given and the theme was consistent between the major players – front engine with a solid rear axle. However, the Corvair was completely different bucking the conventional approach of car design.

The Corvair was the future as the American public had never seen. Besides being "thrifty", the two door only cost about \$2,000 in 1960, it was the ultimate economy car. It was quite the design departure with its innovative unibody construction, air-cooled rear engine, and swing-axle suspension.

One of the design aspects for the rear engine was to eliminate the transmission hump that was all so familiar in nearly every car and truck up to that point. The flat pan design really opened up the interior. I personally love the flat floor pan. It exudes roominess and an unobstructed interior.

The article weaves in and out of the highlights of the Corvair as well as some of the perceived negative aspects of our cars. It also does a good job of pointing out several other cars of that era sporting the swing axle design. But we all know this story line and how Chevrolet resolved the issue in 1964 and, in1965, how the rear end was redesigned to IRS.

It's a short but good read. Enjoy!

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Spring Tips

Winter is almost over so we will be bringing our cars out of storage soon.

Check out the tips below on how to prepare your car for Spring and beyond.

Do a thorough visual inspection by checking your:

Liahts

Wipers

Belts

Brakes, including the brake test

Tires, including the proper front/rear air pressure

Wiring

Battery

Fluids, including brake fluid and motor oil

It is also a good idea to wash and wax your car and clean the interior.

PSA - I wish that I thought of this sooner prior to replacing the manifold donuts. Now that they have been replaced I put a CO monitor in our car to assure us that we do not have an exhaust leak in the cab. This is just as important in the warmer months as exhaust can still work its way into the cab without you realizing it. By the time that headache hits you already have been exposed to too much carbon monoxide.

Once you give your Corvair a once over it's time to take it out for a good long spin to get everything up to operating temperature. Enjoy the drive.

Remember, we are responsible for keeping this marque alive and viable for future generations. We still have the most affordable classic 60's cars in existence but we as a club need to be a part of promoting the Corvair as a really unique and cool collectable car.
