# <u>September – SOS Auto Show</u>

September, PCCA participates in the annual SOS Auto show. This is September 6<sup>th</sup> this year. It's the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the show. PCCA has participated for over 40 of those years. My first exposure was back in 1996. For those wanting to part together at the show, the meet up is the Walmart parking lot on south 6<sup>th</sup> street. Will try to depart at 8:00 am or shortly thereafter. Mike Hall is the chief judge for the show. Expect Brian Nicholson to be judging as well. If you want to be a judge (likely non Corvair class) contact Mike, there is usually a need for more judges.

I pre-registered but you may register at the show. We should have plenty of time to go through the registration line and do final clean up of our cars. It is a judges show, including a look at the undercarriage. Not as strictly judged as a CORSA Concours, but they do have a point system of sorts. There is also a display class for those who want to park on the show field without having to worry about their car being judged. I should do that class myself my Corvair is more a parade car now - meaning it looks good from 10 feet away.

Again this year in the parking lot of the Stratton building. The registration and show headquarters is the visitor center near the show field. AC and running water restrooms. May be a food truck or two nearby or visit Boone's across the street - good food and adult beverages (have a designated driver, please). Downtown eateries should also be open, 5-7 block walk. Capital building open for tours. The Illinois State museum should also be open and is next to the show field.

PCCA will attempt to have a meeting near the Corvairs around 1:00pm.

### The 75th Illinois Secretary of State Vehicle Show (details)

The 75th Illinois Secretary of State Vehicle Show will be held **Saturday, September 6**, at the State Capitol Complex at the corner of Edwards and College Streets in downtown Springfield. First organized in 1949 as an Antique Auto Meet, today the show features not only some of the finest antique and classic vehicles in Illinois, but also sports cars, motorcycles, trucks, and tractors. This time-honored event is held rain or shine. Spectators are FREE! ### Schedule

7 a.m. – 10 a.m.: All participants must be through the show gate and parked, even if pre-registered. Your parking number must be at the registration table at the Capitol Complex Visitors Center located at 425 College Street by 10 a.m.

10 a.m. – 11 a.m.: Participants prepare for judging.

10:45 a.m.: Judges' meeting at Capitol Complex Visitors Center Auditorium.

11 a.m.: Judging begins.

3:30 p.m.: Awards Ceremony – First-, second-, and third-place winners will receive awards in at least 60 classes. An Illinois State Champion award is presented to the vehicle judged best at the show by the Vehicle Show Advisory Committee. This year's show will honor a Marquee Award winner. The Marque Award represents a different automobile manufacturer each year, as chosen by the Vehicle Show Advisory Committee. In 2025, the committee will pay tribute to the 1955 Chrysler 300.

# Meet the Makers of the Chevrolet Corvair

### CORVAIR CONVERTIBLE HISTORIC DEBUT...

March of 1962 brought new and exciting changes to the Corvair model line. Although the 1962 Chevrolet Corvair was introduced to the public in September of 1961, the BIG NEWS came at the end of March (March 27, 1962) with the announcement of the convertible and turbocharger option package (which was added to the Monza line).

To celebrate these new additions, a special gathering of newly made 1962 Corvair Monza convertibles took place at the local Willow Run Assembly Plant in Ypsilanti, Michigan (most likely in April when these cars debuted). We're fortunate to have two photos to commemorate the occasion and they were both taken in front of the Chevrolet Division side of the plant near the famed Rotunda (affectionately known as the "Fishbowl'). If you look closely at the black and white photo...you'll see a new 1962 Chevy II convertible on display inside the Rotunda (round glass building) as this was the first year of its introduction to Willow Run's production model line. We're pretty sure there was also a new 1962 Corvair convertible next to it on display. Willow Run would often place a couple of cars they



were currently producing at the plant and display them in the Fishbowl as a means to entice the public to purchase one of their cars. When the Corvair was first introduced in 1959, there were two 1960 Corvairs in the Rotunda (see cover photo for this page). The Rotunda was used as the reception area entrance to the Executive Offices at Chevrolet and it had a lovely lady receptionist at a desk to welcome guests when visiting for a plant tour or seeing office personnel.

The black and white photo in this post showcases the front of the convertibles, and the color photo has the rear line-up of vehicles selected to be in this image. It appears they included cars with two shades of red (Roman Red, Honduras Maroon), Ermine White, Satin Silver, blue (not sure if it's Nassau

Blue, Silver Blue, or Twilight Blue), and Tuxedo Black in color. It would be nice to know the total number of Corvairs who participated in this special gathering... It would be cool if they had a total of "62" cars but I don't see that many. You can kind of figure out how many there are based on the two photos. (maybe around 33). In the black & white photo...The way the gentlemen are dressed in their trench coats and fedora hats indicates they were probably Willow Run management personnel from the plant (and maybe even a sprinkled Chevrolet employee).


1962 also brought new ways on how General Motors would market the Corvair to the public. Instead of being the basic "economy compact car" as originally introduced; Chevrolet would now call the new 1962 Corvair a "sporting compact car" as they geared their ad campaigns to aim this air-cooled wonder to sportier (rally & racing) crowds...and it worked! You would often see 1962 Corvair sales promotion ads featuring the car in action shots or a photo of a nearby Corvette to emphasize the on par sportiness of the Corvair. This trend would continue in the following years promoting Corvair. Sales figures for 1962 rewarded their efforts. Total production figures for 1962 Corvairs was 328,500 units (broken down to 292,531 cars and 35,969 FC trucks). There were a total of 16,569 Monza convertibles made.

Other Information...The Monza "Spyder" option was only available on the Monza coupes and convertibles with 4 speed transmissions. The addition of 150hp plus available options of chrome engine accents, special emblems, "Spyder" wheel cover inserts, and special dash truly made this one sporty car. There were other upgrades and cosmetic changes made to the 1962 model line. High performance engine, heavy duty suspension, metallic brakes, positraction rear axle, and return to automatic chokes. The 1962 Corvair had a fantastic year in sales figures despite the addition of the Chevy II to the Chevrolet line.

DEBUT INFORMATION: The Corvair Monza Spyder turbo was first shown at the Chicago Auto Show in 1962 which opened on Feb. 17, 1962. The other turbo (Oldsmobile F-85 Jetfire) debuted at the New York Auto Show in April of 1962. FIRST MADE CONVERTIBLE...The first Monza Spyder convertible (photo in post) debuted at the Greenbrier Resort in White Sulphur Springs, WV before a gathering a GM Executives which probably occurred before the Chicago show. P.S. Conley ("Alabama") Phillips was the Willow Run auto worker who was asked to work on the first made convertible. He put the welds on it.

The image in this post is our page cover photo which shows the Chevrolet Motor Division at the Willow Run Assembly Plant in Ypsilanti Twp., Michigan, with two brand new 1960 Corvairs in the glass Rotunda affectionately known as the "Fishbowl". This photo was taken in 1959 when the plant first opened and they continued to place automobiles to showcase them in this display area over the years. The executive offices are located to the left of the Rotunda with a beautiful reception area/offices within the round building. If you look carefully in this photo, you'll see a big "Corvair" sign on the back wall. Would love to know where that went. Most Corvairs were built at Willow Run but there were other plants who also made them.

Arriving in Louisiana the PCCA contingent was meet by those from SMCC each in a newer water cooled vehicle. Somehow we arrived in town close to the same time, 10 minutes or so apart is the same time when one group travels an hour and the

other close to two hours to get to a meeting place.

For lunch the crew went to the Eagles Nest. The restaurant bills itself as a bistro which I think is a fancy name for a café with fancy sandwiches. The food was good and the dessert portions generous. The building itself was very interesting, being an older architecture. I spent time wondering the various

### **Buzzers: Headlight Warning and Turn Signal Flasher**

Many years ago I read a tip in the CORSA Tech Guide on making a headlight warning buzzer, just as NAPA discontinued the one they sold. I collected the parts and made up a batch to install on customer cars. All the parts required are available on eBay or your favorite electronic store:

12V DC 1A Diode (\$0.50 in bulk)

12V DC Piezo Buzzer (\$1.50 in bulk) Shrink fit tubing Mini alligator clips

Solder the diode to the red buzzer wire with the gray band towards the buzzer, add shrink fit tubing and clips. When finished, attach the red wire/clip to the Panel Light fuse holder and the black wire/clip to any switched fuse, such as Radio.



### **Turn Signal Flasher**

Driving at highway speeds in most of my Corvairs makes hearing the turn signal alert difficult.

Making a tin can holder for the flasher and an extension to remote the flasher closer and on metal helped but I still would catch myself daydreaming until cars in front signaled to me that my turn signal had been on for 10 miles. A quick search online came up with a two wire flasher that advertised a "5X louder" signal for \$10. It arrived from Rock Auto and included a remote wire harness to move the flasher closer to the driver plus a metal mounting bracket to possibly amplify the sound. After installation I do not feel it is anywhere close to 5X the sound level and would not recommend it. However, if anyone is interested:



What I did do was use a piezo buzzer from one of the "Headlight Warning Buzzer" units that I

make and hooked it in parallel with the original Corvair flasher unit. It makes a high pitched "beep" that is loud enough to hear on the highway, although maybe a little shrill for sitting at a traffic light. You can adjust the sound by putting layers of tape over the hole in the buzzer. It does not need a diode like the headlight buzzer so you can just add wire for the hook up as you like. Looking at the end of the original flasher with the spades on top, you would hook the red wire on the buzzer to the spade on the right, black wire on the left (if it does not beep, reverse the hookup at the dashboard side since different years have different layouts).



In the setup below both units make a noise but the piezo buzzer is much louder and does not have to be attached to anything. The original flasher unit does not have to be grounded since it works with current flow only.
