

A "Master" Class in Early Brakes—Robert Gold


I first want to say what gets me through the woes of various repairs on my classic (read - old) Corvairs. Just when I think I've fixed all the issues, a new one will crop up. What keeps me going is summed up in my saying, "It's worth the hassle if it has a happy ending". I should also admit that a lot of those problems are a result of my overenthusiasm concerning buying cars. Take for instance a recent purchase I made from Dave Langlois of a nice looking 63 red Spyder. As the old saying goes, "It's a looker". My main regret with that purchase is my not knowing much about its brakes.



I first want you see the master cylinder that was installed in that 63. Notice something strange? Yep, it's a dual master cylinder in the place of the stock single one. For sure it is a safer option, but it caused a real headache when Dave delivered me the car along with his opinion that the master cylinder was BAD. I at first ordered the 67-69 dual master Dave suggested. That didn't work so I arranged for another shop to work on it. I have to tell you it was quite a drive across town to the repair shop when the pedal stops under an inch from the floor. After getting to the shop alive I decided I needed to share what I learned about dual master cylinders. Maybe that would save someone's life. Lol.

The shop I took it to wasn't very helpful at first. They just couldn't figure out how to obtain a replacement master cylinder. It is here that I get to tell you about Keith at Keith's Wheel Alignment. I stopped by to see if he knew what was going on. It turns out he did! He had me look on the side of the cast iron shell of the master cylinder and there stood several numbers cast into the side. Mystery solved! Keith thought it was an early 60's Chevy, he was wrong on that one. I got my magnifying glass and flashlight and found the Bendix manufactured part number and looked it up online. After consulting Dr. Google I discovered this master cylinder went to a 74 Jeep CJ5! Weird. But it was true, and of course the Bendix dual master cylinder is no longer being made. Lucky for me Raybestos does make that master cylinder and I bought it from Walmart at a bargain! All this leads to a happy ending. I now have a 63 Vair with a Jeep master cylinder. It sure beats the "Flintstones" brake system the Spyder had when I bought it. I hope my story helps if you are faced with a car in which someone had "improved" the car's brakes.



An "F" in Corvair 101—Ignorance is no excuse—Robert Gold



In addition to driving our wonderful Corvairs another thing we routinely do is try to find someone competent to fix our rides. Alas, we are not all as knowledgeable as Dave Huntoon or Tarmo Sutt. With this said let me show you an online ad that I discovered when I was looking for someone to fix the brakes on my 63 Spyder:

So folks, what conclusion would you draw from the ad? To me it meant this business knew something about classic or modified cars. They also mentioned online their ability to work on other problems including water pumps

and such. After reading all this I was not prepared for my reception when I drove my 63 over to their shop. I won't go into too much detail but after I asked them to do brake work on my car the guy running the shop asked me, "What kind of brakes does a Corvair have?" WHAT??!! A shop that specializes in custom and classic car work doesn't know what kind of brakes are on a 63 Corvair? Sadly, I should have left immediately but I stuck around to see what they could do for me. It ended with the boss saying he MIGHT be willing to work on my car, but if it needed parts he wouldn't store it at his shop and I'd need to bring it back. What he was asking was for me to drive a car with a brake problem home! It was at that point I got out of there and luckily my car got me home safely.

What should we take away from my experience at this shop? First, do what I did and check them out online to see what kind of work they do. But I also suggest you check out Yelp to see what their customers say. That is something I didn't do. If I had I would have read the following rating:

"Beware", please check reviews on google before you go to Wheel Align II. This will save you a lot of money and disappointment.

Happily for me, I avoided the disappointment, and I would recommend you Corvair folks do the same and find the right shop for your car.

A Corvair, A Candidate, and an Important Car Show.—Robert Gold



To be honest this report began as a normal car show report. On November 1 I entered my 66 Corsa in Phil Lovato's Feed NM Kids car show. Phil has hosted this show for a number of years at his vehicle repair business, Phil Lovato and Sons. He sponsors the show as a means to raise funds and food for the charity, Feed NM Kids. His last two attempts were not treated very well by "Mother Nature", but this year the cool morning gave way to a glorious day. In response, turnout was stellar.

However, rather than simply talk about what kinds of cars showed up I've elected to tell a tale related to politics in our community. Sadly, my Corvair was the only one at the show, so I had to park next to a



random "X" ride. I found an open spot between a pre-war



ride and a Mustang. This turned out to be a significant place to be, because I was parked next to a candidate for Mayor of Albuquerque, Louie Sanchez.

I should note that I've lived in a number of large cities, such as St. Louis, Kansas City, Denver, and Nashville, before arriving in the Land of Enchantment. Living in those other places provided little chance of me meeting any sort of major political candidate, but that is not the case in Albuquerque. Looking

back, I vividly remember standing around in downtown when our then Governor, Bruce King walked by, by himself. For any of you who remember Bruce, he loved shaking people's hands. Be-

fore I knew it I was shaking hands with the Governor. It was just him and me. What a memory.

I was struck by the fact that he had set up with his hotrod Mustang with nothing more than a small table of promotional water bottles and information sheets. It was only two days before the election and Louie was "Hanging with the Homies", as nice as he could be. After a moment I built up the courage to talk to him. I won't say whether I voted for him, but the very fact he was a car guy meant a lot to me. He was even kind enough to say that though he had the Mustang he mostly had Chevys before that. I found him gracious and I want to thank him for his support of a worthy cause and his kindness to me.



LED Lights for a Corvair—John Lawrence



I installed LED lights in my 66 Monza Sport Coupe, replacing the original type incandescent. The LED bulbs I chose were direct plug in replacements which do not require any wiring changes, relays or flicker filters. I first replaced the AC T3 headlights with *Octane Lightning* LEDs. I rarely drive at

night, but when I do a well lit road is necessary for these old eyes. These bulbs are direct plug-and-play replacements for the 5 3/4" sealed beams. They came with two types of bulbs - halogen H4 and LED. They are similar in look to the original headlights. This feature was attractive to me because



many of the LED headlights now offered have a much different look than the conventional vintage ones. The set of four I ordered from Amazon cost \$200. The headlights were aimed and I was eager to see how well they performed. The first experience driving

home in the dark with the new headlights was - well, like night and day. The new lights illuminated the road much better with a bright well focused pattern. I felt more comfortable and safe with these new

LEDs. Oncoming traffic did not seem to be bothered by the lights. This can be a problem with some of the new style headlights. The high beams made a brighter light pattern but did not seem to increase the pattern distance much. This was not a concern as the pattern has a long reach. Having had success with the headlights, I decided to change out the rest of the exterior lights. I found LED re-




placements for the 1156 (back-up) and 1157 (stop/turn signal/tail/parking) bulbs on Amazon. They are also a direct one-for-one re-



placement for the original bulbs. The LED turn signal bulbs require an electronic flasher because the current draw is too low to trigger a conventional flasher. The flasher is a direct plug in replacement but requires connecting a ground lead. Amazon was the source for the flasher too. The two 1156 and four 1157 LED replacement bulbs cost \$30 and the flasher was \$8. I bought the LED replacement for the license light (type 57) from AeroLites. Its cost was \$7. The new LEDs are brighter than the original type bulbs and more visible especially in daylight. The total cost for this change over was about \$250. This is not an insignificant amount, but I feel it was well worth it given the increased safety factor.

Overall, I am pleased with the LEDs and recommend doing this, especially for the headlights.
