

RAMPSIDE CAMPSIDE

GM dealers sold a delightful little camper made to fit the Rampside. It provided a surprising amount of comfort within the confines of the Rampside bed. The camper itself was made and installed by the Traville factory in Marcellus, Michigan. It was not a separate unit, but was actually built into the truck bed. The suggested retail price for the camper was \$1245.00 F.O.B. Detroit. Traville Corporation would deliver the complete unit, driving it, for 11 cents per mile. I have heard, but not seen in print, that 300 of these units were produced.


Here are two photos (see cover for first photo, ed.) of my 1963 Campside. During the time of manufacture, some changes were made in the details, but all the Campsides were basically similar. The amenities in my Campside include kitchen cabinets, counter top, gas stove, sink, gas refrigerator, marine toilet, 12 gallon water tank, 15 gallon septic tank, water pump, bench seat which converts to a double bed, hanging bed for a child (some units had two such beds), removable small table, roof vent, three large jalousie windows with curtains, gas space heater (optional), and electric lights (powered by either 12 volts or 110 volts). The basic utilities (toilet, sink, stove, refrigerator, and cabinets) are installed just behind the cab and forward of the camper door. Arrangements of these interior items varied somewhat over the years of production.

The structure of the camper shell is of welded heavygauge aluminum, (not wood, which is so often found rotting in other campers). In earlier models, the entire front panel above the cab was Plexiglas. By 1963 that front panel was aluminum with a slightly smaller window installed. Likewise, the earlier models had the propane tanks mounted at bumper height. Later, they were mounted on the camper shell just above the tailgate of the Rampside (presumably for safety reasons). The side door fits within the opening for the ramp, providing easy access without requiring a step. A large front window aligns with the rear window of the cab, providing a view of the road and of the interior of the camper. The exterior height of the entire camper is 90.5 inches; width does not extend beyond the sides of the Rampside. An exterior canopy slides into a track over the door of the camper to provide additional space, given the cramped nature of the interior.

Other types of campers were also made to fit the Rampside. The Cam-Pact 95, made in Nokomis, Florida, had a fiberglass shell with a shape similar to the Campside. Some campers had a more square look, and extended beyond the sides of the Rampside. GM literature also shows a camper made for the Loadside, with a rearward-opening door.

I've often wondered how many more styles were made for the Rampside, and how many may be left.
