My Rampside Ownership Story

#5 in a series by Ray Coker

"What's Taking So Long?"

If you've ever had a vehicle painted by yourself or by anyone, you know that there

is some disassembly and reassembly to do which takes delicate care so nothing gets scratched during the reassembly process.

Imagine a vehicle with a bare dashboard, two bare doors with no glass or rubber seals, no glass regulators and no latch assemblies in them, two bumpers to that have to be assembled and installed, a ramp, a tailgate etc, etc, etc.

I need to be especially careful because the painter is in North Carolina and as much as I like to visit North Carolina I don't want to go there just because of some carelessness.

As you can see by these photos the truck is almost road ready. I still have to spray the bed floor and I have to get the seat and the sun visors recovered. I ordered new mag wheels for it and when they arrived one of them had been damaged during shipment somewhere between China and my house.

I didn't find out about the damage until two days later when I took the wheels to a garage to have the tires installed. The garage owner was unpacking them when he discovered the damage. Yet another reason for the delays!

The engine needed a new fan bearing installed due to the noise it was making so I removed the top engine sheet metal to install the bearing while the tailgate was off the truck... making it much easier. I then took the time to paint those sheet metal parts to give the engine a clean appearance.

I took the advice of Dave Motohead and his YouTube video which shows him replacing the fan bearing by heating up the engine top cover until the fan bearing shaft was able to be pulled out by hand. I then installed the new frozen fan bearing immediately into the engine top cover while it was still hot.

(It's not the first time my wife has discovered car parts in the freezer).

It's back together now and the fan bearing noise has disappeared. Replacing the fan bearing by using heat without removing the top engine cover was so easy.

I have an appointment to have the windshield and the back cab glass installed by professionals next week. I'm aware they are both installed by using the rope-in method but I still rely on professionals to do the job. I am not a person with patience and when you are working with glass or you are a doctor you need patients or patience. I have neither.

I will be driving this special vehicle very soon then I have two more special vehicles to work on. First is my wife's little sports car which has a hard top convertible that doesn't work. Second is my 1965 Corvair Corsa coupe, "Fast Orange," which is not running as well as it should.

Duck and Cover

Tere's a Corvair radio, a '63 to judge by the trim plate. See those two little triangle symbols between 5⁵ & 7 and between 11 & 14? Do you remember why they were there?



They are CONELRAD markings, marking AM frequencies 640 and 1240 where info could be found when Khrushchev dropped the Big One and it was time to "duck and cover."

By law, radio sets manufactured between 1953 and 1963 had to have these two frequencies marked by the triangle-in-circle symbol of Civil Defense.

From Wikipedia: "In the event of an emergency, all United States television and FM radio stations were required to stop broadcasting. Upon alert, most AM medium-wave stations shut down. The stations that stayed on the air would transmit on either 640 or 1240 kHz. They would transmit for several minutes and then go off the air,

and another station would take over on the same frequency in a "round robin" chain. This was to confuse enemy aircraft who might be navigating using radio direction finding."

The 1960 Corvair Owner Guide has a picture in which the CONELRAD frequencies (640 and 1240) are pointed out. From 1961-64, in both car and FC Owners Guides the CONELRAD frequencies are described in a box labled "Radio Tips."

While the CONELRAD markings were required from 1953 to 1963, some car radios had them for a little longer. The use of these frequencies was ended in August, 1963, when the first '64 models were already on their way to the showroom; radios without the markings would not reach the factories until later. The description of the CONELRAD frequencies is found in the first edition of the 1964 Corvair Owners Guide but is gone in the seocnd edition.

"A comprehensive set of technical specifications for every Corvair from every year, paired to a collection of images from original brochures, giving a thorough view of one of the most unique American cars ever made."


