
Second, I want to thank my fellow officers for their support over the last 12 months, and all the people who either attended a meeting program, or put one on themselves.

REC TECH TIP FOR THE 15TH TO 241 ATZberger.

Here's an easy fix that anyone can do in a few minutes. It may make this difference between driving in comfort or breaking out these units using the heater.

Clean your oil dipstick. If just a tiny bit into the tube, check the tank's gasket. If it has deteriorated, replace it. A temporary quick fix would be to wrap it with a thin strip of cloth... anything to make it air tight. The dipstick must fit snugly.

Next, take off your oil filter cap. Hold it in your hand & gently pry out the thin o-ring seal. Next, get this gasket as a replacement. Cut it like I did. There's a piece of cardboard approximately 1/8" thick. Sand thickness. Slip the gasket between the old one & the brass spring plate in the cap. It would require some added force to hold it back into place. It must be straight also.

Now, you may ask, "Where will the gasket be used?" The right rear of your engine, because the far & the right carburetor, there is a pipe. In this pipe, these hoses are forced through this pipe, a PCV (Positive Crankcase Ventilation) valve & into your air cleaner. There is also a vacuum line, (cross-over pipe) between your two carbs. The hoses are also directed into your carburetor intake system via the crossover pipe. Supposedly, the carbs are then burned up with this carburetor air/gas mixture and isn't a lot better than burning them in the front seat with you!!

If your transmission fluid keeps dropping and is not leaking, try your own bubbles blowing out the lights and well are present if you don't see white smoke coming out the tailpipe during acceleration changes. Use the "Auston" regulator for the transmission shifter. This is an easy part to replace. Kindly call Stanislaw Tech.

I have another suggestion relative to the vehicle condition of your present car. If you have had to do some updating, such as, new headlight lenses, new door handle, new door seals, etc., try experimenting with a thicker gasket under the hood. I think this in the range of 3/8" to 1" would help. It increased as car and one other one I know about. It's worth a try.
