"The Panther Hollow Concourse" is planned for next year, and a reserved section of the area will be available for Corvairs in the future.

Next was the Central Pa. Corvair Club "CORVAIR DAYS" show in Strasburg, Pa. This year's show was absolutely the best effort their club has ever made. There were antique shows and flea markets in every direction. There was even another car show near by for anyone who was tired of looking at the more than 60 Corvairs at our own show!

The banquet included the best food ever in the traditional family style of that Pennsylvania Dutch area. It was hot, fresh, varied and plentiful... perhaps even downright sinful.

To top off the banquet, Bill Artzberger with Wayne Jones as his producer, director and projectionist, conducted an hour-long slide show on techniques to restore Corvairs.
