Dave Fabyonic & Don Baker discussed the Vintage Grand Prix events. Brochure enclosed-



There may be danger lurking in a classic car that has been hidden in the proverbial barn for years. Probably mice found it before you did, and the untidy creatures may have left an unpleasant mess behind.

The pathogen, called hantavirus, can cause respiratory failure. The first systems may appear two to four weeks after exposure, & include fever, headache, and coughing. If infection is suspected, quickly inform your doctor that you may have been exposed to rodent droppings.

The first known mortality from Hantavirus in the United States occurred in Arizona in '93. This strain of virus previously occurred in Korea, and similar strains were found throughout Eurasia. The virus is carried by rodents, including deer mouse, pinion mouse, house mouse, and western chipmunk. Rodents carry the virus, in their lungs and kidneys, but it apparently does not make them ill. Infected rodents shed large quantities of virus in saliva, urine and feces. Hantavirus should not be confused with HIV or AIDS.

Humans are infected when the dust containing the virus is inhaled, swallowed, or enters cuts in the skin. Infection can also occur by rubbing the eyes, nose or mouth after handling contaminated material. People become sick after cleaning barns, disturbing rodent infested areas when hicking, and living in infested buildings. Fortunately, no known cases have been reported from auto restoration.

From Vaun- One such car with mice/rats came into our shop. They ate thru the security alarm, telephone, and radio speaker wires. The car's cotton seat padding took it hard. They've clogged air cleaners, and the like. My comments is to PLEASE be careful.
