### "Gentlemen, Start Your Engines!"

It is recorded that the first electric starters, as we know them today, were installed in the 1912 Cadillacs. But there were many types of starters that preced-

ed this landmark date.

The most basic was for the car owner to turn off the ignition with the throttle wide open. Supposedly, the raw fuel would cause the gas/air mixture to explode and start the engine. A variation of this method was to pump acetylene into the combustion chamber upon starting.

Then, compressed air was used to fill the cylinders, causing the pistons to turn the crankshaft and the engine would start. Maybe? A variation of this was to store exhaust gas in a pressure tank. This exhaust pressure was destined to pressurize the combustion chambers. Questionably, which came first, the

chicken or the egg? Where did the exhaust come from to start the cycle? From another car, perhaps?

Further, there was a spring mechanism attached to the hand crank. It had to be hand wound. Upon release it spun the engine enough

to start it. Maybe? We hope so.


This leads to the present-day electric starter that most of us are familiar with. It was invented by *Charles Kettering*. He was an electrical engineer and had just resolved a problem of operating a cash register with and electric motor.

His thinking revolved around the idea that if an electric motor was small enough to operate a cash register drawer for only brief periods of time, a

small electric motor could be used to start and automobile engine. A small electric motor could be overloaded briefly as long as it could be cooled down between uses.

Your Corvair starter is an unusually large motor. Although the Corvair engine

is comparatively small, it is also of the high-compression type. This is one of the reasons for the over-sized starter. Corvair starters, if not abused by continual running in some hard-to-start Corvairs, will last the life of the car. Your owners manual states that you should not use your starter for more than 15 seconds at a time.



replaced too. All of this is an easy job that can be done on your kitchen table (while your spouse isn't looking).

With new bearings and brushes (very reasonably priced) your repaired starter will last as long as its old car owner.


