

Thoughts from the Editor

t some point last year, my friend Dave Ritter, whom I have mentioned in earlier writings, and who, I'm sorry to say, has moved to Greenville, Tennessee, handed off a few issues of Hemmings Classic Car magazine for me to peruse. Dave has had subscriptions to any number of car magazines just like the rest of us. He's what I'd call, an arm chair classic car enthusiast. Like me, his mechanical knowledge of cars is pretty limited. He once bought a 1959 Ford, his first, last and only venture into owning a classic car. His love affair with this car however, was short lived when mechanical problems developed immediately. There was a happy ending: the seller agreed to take back his '59 Ford and return Dave's money. Now that's what I'd call a fair deal.

As I was saying, he gave me several issues of *Hemmings Classic Car* magazine. I too have subscried to *Road and Track, Car and Driver, Motor Trend* and a couple of other magazines whose mastheads I've long forgotten. I've tired of reading about cars that have horse-power ratings that the average Jane or Joe will never, ever need unless they're driving a getaway car in a bank heist or burning rubber at the drag strip.

Just the other day at the bottom of page 1 of the *Post-Gazette* an ad for a Cadillac claimed you could reach 0-60 before you could turn the page. That's a bit absurd; not the claim, but the fact that it's a reality. I wonder what the speedometer reads when you've turned to page eight and the driver decides to make a call on the cell phone. I don't think I want to be on the same road with that car and driver.

Did it again; I went off on another tangent. Let's see if I can keep my train of thought when I start again.

Since reading a terrific article about a beautiful '50s Buick in one of Dave's magazines, I have been singing it's praises. The magazine showcases classic cars and the work it took to get them to their present state of excellence. Yet, not every car shown is perfect. Some have dings, dents and rust.

There are articles about artists who rendered cars for print advertising, articles about individuals who have had a profound effect on the automotive industry, the retooling of automotive manufacturers during the first half of the 1940s to meet the needs of the war effort as well as other classic car related features. I especially love articles that show clay concepts of cars before they reached the final street version.

If you've read this magazine, perhaps you share my enthusiasm. If you're not familiar with it, take a peek at it the next time you're at your favorite bookseller. I think you might agree.
