Saturday started with a drive along the beautiful Highland Scenic


Buck. Lunch was arranged at the Country Roads Cafe. This was originally a country store and it still had the shelves along the walls with the sliding ladders used to reach the top



The Long Winter Nap

- 4) Remove the battery and connect it to a battery tender (indoors).
- 5) Cover your Corvair with a car cover.
- 6) Check the battery water once every month.

I have my Corvair on dollys so that I can store it crosswise in the back of my garage, but taking the car's weight off of the tires is a better option.


Be sure to mark your calendars for the holiday party on January 14 at Nu Babcock Banquet Facility on Babcock Blvd.
